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WATSON ADVOCATE OF CUT IN FEDERAL TAX

Favors Maximum Levy of 35 Per Cent on Combined Normal and Surtax on Net Income.

Washington, July 9.—Reduction of federal taxes by at least \$200,000,000 was advocated today by Senator Watson, of Indiana, a member of the senate finance committee. He favored a limit of 25 per cent for the combined normal and surtax on net income, but was not prepared to specify any surtax rates he would support at the next congressional session.

Predicting that under existing law the nation's existing bonded indebtedness would be reduced \$5,500,000,000 by 1935, he also declared himself opposed to granting any funding terms to debtors more lenient than those given Great Britain, with the possible exception of an extension of time for final settlement. Any concessions in principal or interest rates, he said, would cause great dissatisfaction in England, and probably require negotiation of new terms with that government.

Mr. Watson, who is chairman of the interstate commerce committee, predicted that the next session would see little action in railroad legislation and expressed opposition to the enactment of compulsory consolidation, holding that any attempt in that direction would be unconstitutional. The railroads are, in his opinion, working out among themselves a satisfactory consolidation arrangement, and should be left free of congressional interference in solving the problem.

Only One Woman in Landis Case Put Under Bond.

In the Landis abducting and kidnapping case heard in the county court Tuesday and in which Goldie May Mills and Carrie Honeycutt, two young white women, were the defendants, probable cause was found as to only one of the women, Goldie May Mills, mother of the child alleged to have been abducted. The other woman, Carrie Honeycutt, was exonerated by Judge Coggin of any complicity in the affair and the case was stricken off the docket as to her. The Mills woman's appearance bond was fixed at \$200 which was given.

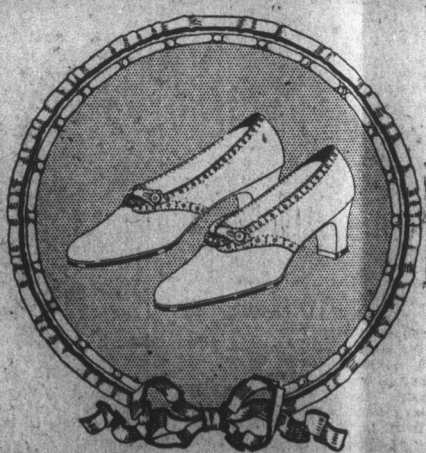
