PICNIC TOMORROW AT NAZARETH ORPHANS' HOME

It is Expected That 8,000 People Will Be at Crescent Thursday. Tomorrow is the annual picnic day for Nazareth Orphans' Home at Crescent. This is the one big picnic day for the Reformed Church, as well as for the Orphans' Home. It is the one big picnic day for the people of Rowan county and also for the northern part of Cabarrus and for Concord people.

The expectations are for at least 8000 people this year. Last year the estimates ran above 7000. Each year the number increases. Two features of the day are: First, the address by Rev Paul S. Leinbach, D.D., L.L.D., of Philadelphia. Dr. Leinbach is the Editor of the Reformed Church Messenger, an able speaker, a man of earnest spirit and conviction. He has been pastor of larger Reformed congregations in Eaton, Pa., and New York City. The second is the children's program in the afternoon. This promises to be one of the best ever given by the Home. The Home is pleased to announce that the Auditorium is now seated with very good folding chairs and will seat more than 6000. This will be welcomed by those desiring to hear either of the programs at 11 a. m. or 2:30 p. m. The Jackson Training school band will furnish music.

The Bear Creek Church will have their table as usual. This table is picnic style and always the very best. The Faith charge will have a stand and in addition will serve barbecued pig and chicken. The Rockwell charge will have their stand as usual. These tables and stands turn over to the Treasurer of the home the gross receipts for the day—less a little necessary expenses for the purchase of some materials. The income on Anniversary day is near \$2,000. The semi-annual meeting of the Board is held this afternoon. Rev. W. C. Lively of Trinity Church is secretary of the board and is in attendance. A successor to Superintendent McNairy is to be elected. The finishing of the building program is the one big item of business. The \$40,000 girls' dormitory is nearing completion.
