Graeber, of Shelby, have returned to their home after visiting Mrs. J. C. Cook and Mrs. T. L. Chaney in the city. Miss Ruth Klutz was operated on for the removal of her tonsils in Charlotte Friday. She will return to Concord today. Dr. Summerville, a member of the faculty of Queen's College, will preach at the First Presbyterian Church Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. Miss Louise Bennett, of Quitman, Ga., guest here of Miss Helen Marsh, will sing the offertory at the morning service at the First Presbyterian Church tomorrow. One man charged with abandonment was sentenced to serve 30 days on the chaingang in police court Friday afternoon. In the other case tried the defendant submitted and forfeited his bond. The condition of Miss Lillian McKinley, who had her tonsils removed at the Concord Hospital recently, is very much improved, and she expects to return to her home in a few days. PERSONAL Henry Suther, negro charged with entering Cline & Moose's store Thursday night, was not given a hearing in police court Friday. Officers state that the case will come up in recorder's court Monday afternoon. B. E. Harris, city clerk and treasurer, is engaged now in computing city taxes. Mr. Harris plans to rush the work so the receipts for the year can be turned over to C. N. Fields, city tax collector, in the near future. The grandstand at the Gibson Mill baseball park, destroyed several weeks ago during a windstorm here, is being rebuilt. The stand will be different from the old one and will be arranged to accommodate more than 1,000 fans. Quite a number of Lutheran laymen of this city plan to go to Thomasville tomorrow for the District Lutheran Brotherhood meeting. The meeting will be held in the First Lutheran Church at 3 p. m., and a program that will be of interest to laymen will be carried out. Both Pittsburgh and New York won the National League Friday, keeping their relative standings. In the American League Washington won while Philadelphia was losing. In the South Atlantic Charlotte strengthened its hold on first place by winning while Spartanburg was losing. Preparations are being made now for the widening of the road from China Grove to Salisbury. A sewer line is being laid on the road now near Salisbury and at the same point the road is being widened. This road is to be reworked and widened all the way from Salisbury to China Grove. Dr. T. N. Spencer, secretary of the Cabarrus Fair Association, plans to put a force of hands at work on the fair grounds next week. The grounds have been kept in fair condition throughout the winter, but they are always cleaned and improved preparatory to the opening of the fair. Work on the race track will be started in time to get it in fine condition for the fair. Property in No. 4 township has been sold to A. F. Hartsell by W. H. Gillis, according to a deed filed Friday. Another deed records the sale of land near Kannapolis by Jacob H. H. Sloop to C. M. Sloop for \$6,000 and still another deed records the sale of land in Shankletown by Thomas Shankle to A. F. Goodman and D. A. McLaurin for \$300. Quite a number of architects want to draw plans for the new school buildings to be erected in the county. It is learned at the office of Prof. J. B. Robertson. Several architects have called to see Prof. Robertson during the past week and others have written him. It is not known now when the county board of education will be ready for plans as no definite date for starting the work on the buildings has been decided on.

WORK COMMENCED ON MT. PLEASANT ROAD Grading for the New Concrete Link Already Begun—The Detour is Still Rough. Work has been started on the highway from Mt. Pleasant to the county line. The grading of the 3.07 miles of roadway is underway and at an early date the laying of the hard surface will be begun. The new link will be of concrete, similar to the unit on the Concord-Charlotte highway leading out of Concord. Detours are being worked on but are still in rather bad condition. Although the regular highway will be opened for traffic Sunday, it is to be closed Monday and will be blocked all of next week, highway officials stated. 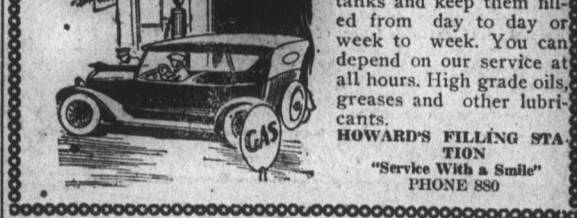
