CHANGING OUR VIEWS ABOUT THE AUTOMOBILE.

Many persons contend that the automobile, despite its commercial value, has been detrimental to the country because people buy cars who should be buying homes. But facts do not prove this contention to be entirely true, although none can argue that many persons too poor to buy the roof over their heads have purchased in some manner an auto.

However, according to the Bureau of Labor, the auto is now a stimulus to home ownership. The bureau has issued statistics indicating that the trend of a few years ago from the one-family house to the apartment is beginning to be reversed. From 1920 to 1924 more and more families sought the apartment rather than the one-family home. The percentage of home dwellers sank from 53 per cent. to 41 per cent., in cities of more than 25,000 population. But this year sees a reversion of the tide. The percentage of those living in homes is beginning to increase again. More families are seeking the home instead of the "flat."

The Bureau notes a remarkable extension in suburbs where most of the dwellings are of the old-fashioned single-family type. One of the principal reasons for the increasing suburban development, it believes, is the automobile, and as it is known that most of the houses in these developments are built for sale and not for rental, the conclusion therefore is that home ownership is showing a tendency to increase, the trend being brought about partly or largely as a result of ownership of automobiles.

The Greenville, S. C., News, agrees with the bureau, pointing out that "the attitude of people toward autos is undoubtedly undergoing a change. The machine is looked upon less and less as a luxury and a mere instrument of pleasure and recreation, and more and more as a necessary means of transportation. It is getting down into the class of essentials, like bread and butter. As it becomes so more and more, it becomes less of a competitor of home owning, and more of an accompaniment of the solid, necessary things of life, like homes."

WISCONSIN VOTES AS IT PLEASES.

Wisconsin voters have again gone to the polls and voted as they desired. They elected Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., to the United States Senate by a majority of more than 100,000.

There was nothing surprising about the election to be sure. The Regular Republicans, led by Senator Lenroot, made a fight but it amounted to nothing. Young LaFollette promised to carry on to the best of his ability the work of his father and that was enough for the Wisconsin voters.

The people of Wisconsin are not bound in any way, with party ties. Several years ago they elected a Democrat to the Senate because they considered him a progressive. They defeated another Democrat because they did not like him, and not because
