Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Kalbfleisch were confirmed as members of All Saints Episcopal Church Thursday night at a service conducted by Bishop E. A. Penick, of Charlotte. Saddy Dobson, well known negro of Concord, died at his home Thursday morning. Funeral services were held this afternoon. Dobson was an aged negro and spent practically all his life in Concord. Colored teachers of the county will meet with Prof. J. B. Robertson at the court house tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. The meeting will be the first regular one of the year and plans for the year's work will be outlined by Prof. Robertson. Two football games today are attracting much interest. One is the Furman-Wake Forest game in Asheville and the other is the Duke-Wofford game in Spartanburg. On the seas it records Furman and Wofford are given the edge but both games promise to be hard fought throughout. Highway officials declared this morning that the work on the highway beyond Mt. Pleasant is at a standstill, the concrete mixer which was supposed to have been sent here some time ago, having failed to arrive. Present indications, it was declared, are that the road will not be finished until spring. The basement of the jail was not damaged by the fire discovered about 9 o'clock Thursday morning. The entire basement is of cement so there was nothing to burn. The walls were badly smoked but outside of that no damage resulted from the fire which started in a pile of newspapers and boards. No new cases are to be tried in recorder's court this afternoon but several persons convicted at Monday's session of the court will be sentenced by Judge M. H. Caldwell. Two of these defendants were found guilty of assaults with deadly weapons and the other was found guilty of driving an automobile while intoxicated. Rain, amounting to .25 of an inch fell Thursday night but stopped this morning and the weather remained partly clear all this morning. The frequent showers recently have raised the hopes of the people of the city that the Southern Power Company may be able to furnish power to meet all the demands at an early date. Elaborate preparations are being made today for the Father and Son banquet which is to be held tonight at the Y. M. C. A. The gymnasium is being decorated and tables placed for the annual event. No tickets will be sold at the door, it is declared by Mr. Blanks, and persons wishing to attend will have to procure their tickets this afternoon. The work of paving the short strip of roadway at the underpass on the Concord-Kannapolis highway is being rushed to completion. It is expected that the concrete will be laid by tomorrow and only several days will be required for setting and drying. When this is completed, a strip which has been very rough for over two years will be eliminated. Persons who ordered tickets for the Carolina-Virginia football game should not be alarmed if the tickets are late reaching Concord. The work of mailing the passes was started Monday but as all of them are being registered it requires some time to get them in the mail.
