The Army defeated the Navy in their annual football game Saturday, the game being the last big one in the east. South Carolina defeated Centre 20 to 0 at Columbia, S. C., while a few other games were being played in various parts of the country.

A supper and get-together for the Concord ministers this evening at 6 o'clock at the Y. M. C. A. This is the first meeting of the year of the ministerial association, which plans to hold regular monthly meetings similar to those held last year.

Deputy Sheriff Honeycutt and County Welfare Officer Brown seized a 100 gallon still Friday. The still, which was operated with two oil stoves, was located on Coddle Creek in No. 2 township. No beer or liquor could be found near the still by the officers.

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Horton, who live near the Jackson Training School, was buried Saturday afternoon following his death on Friday. Interment was made in the cemetery at Rocky River Church, the funeral services being held at the home.

Women of the city were today selling the Red Cross tuberculosis seals in the streets and in the stores and homes. Reports from the women who were doing the work indicated that there would be an unusually large number of the seals sold this year.

Twelve cases will be tried in re-ord's court this afternoon, police officers state. Seven defendants are charged with being intoxicated, two with having liquor in their possession, one with speeding, one with operating a car while intoxicated and one with larceny.

Heavy ice was reported in the city this morning, with temperatures very low. The colder weather started Saturday night and continued over Sunday and today, with temperatures dropping below the freezing point last night. The low temperatures prevailed despite a cloudless sky and a warm sun throughout yesterday.

Arnold Miller has returned to Concord from Norfolk after having been given an honorable discharge from the United States army. He was accompanied home by his wife and they will make their home for the present at the home of Mrs. Miller's parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Sides on Meadow street.

That the annual Father and Son banquet here makes a big impression on the youngsters is shown by the answer a child gave in Sunday School here last week to the question, "What Have We To Be Thankful For?" "I am thankful for the Father and Son Banquet," the boy replied to the question asked by his Sunday School teacher.

Much interest is continuing to be shown by the business men of the city in the volleyball classes which are held each afternoon during the week at 6 o'clock. A game is planned this week between Kannapolis and the local Y team. The Kannapolis team, last year's state champions, look strong again this year and are generally conceded to be the strongest in the state.

LARGE INCREASE IN SUNDAY SCHOOL ROLL

Baptist Schools Have Gained Million Members in Last Ten Years. Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 28.—Enrollment in Southern Baptist Sunday schools in the last ten years has increased from 1,608,871 to 2,534,953, Dr. I. K. J. Van Ness, Secretary of the Baptist School Board, in announcing the fifth annual South-wide organized Bible class conference at Birmingham, January 12 to 14.

Dr. Van Ness ascribes this increase to new life brought into Sunday schools through the impetus of the thousands of organized classes. "So rapidly are many of the Sunday school growing that the churches are having to greatly enlarge their plants to take care of the increased number of pupils," he said. Representatives of hundreds of the leading organized Baptist Bible classes from 17 states and the District of Columbia will attend the Birmingham gathering, the secretary said.
