KANNAPOLIS PEOPLE IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

M. W. Henderson and Three Sons Hurt in Accident Near Charlotte Saturday Afternoon.

The following from Sunday's Charlotte News will be of interest to Concord and Cabarrus county persons:

M. W. Henderson, of Kannapolis, and his three sons, Eugene, aged eleven years, Leonard, aged nine, and Clyde, aged five, were patients in the Charlotte Sanatorium Saturday night suffering from injuries as the result of an automobile wreck about five miles north of this city, on the Concord road Saturday about 3 p. m. The car, in which they were coming to Charlotte, was in a collision with one driven by George Beck, of Princeton, N. J.

Clyde Henderson sustained the most serious injury of any of the occupants of the Henderson car. His skull was fractured and his left arm was badly cut. His brother, Eugene, also suffered a slight fracture of the skull and cuts and bruises. Leonard came out of the wreck with only minor bruises. Mr. Henderson suffered severe bruises about the shoulder, it was said at the hospital. Clyde's injuries are not expected to prove fatal. He was conscious and responding to treatment well, hospital attendants said.

Mr. Beck was injured. His two companions, Knight Alsbrook and Brinson Goddard, also of Princeton, N. J., escaped without a scratch.

The accident was caused by slippery roads, Mr. Alsbrook explained in his room at Hotel Charlotte, late Saturday night. His party was headed toward Charlotte as was the Henderson car. They came near each other and "there was a skid and the wreck happened," he said. S. S. Rogers, Mecklenburg county rural policeman, investigated the accident but made no arrest, Chief Vic Fesperman said.

Contract for remodeling and making the addition to the former York & Rogers store for the Charles Stores Co., of Baltimore, was awarded Saturday to J. A. Gardner, local contractor, the work to start within the next week or two and be completed by March 15.

Improvements will include putting in a new front, extending the basement and first and second floors backward by an addition about 50 feet deep, making the length of the store 200 feet; giving about 22,500 feet of floor space, it was announced yesterday by Charles Coplon, president.
