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WHAT WILL BE ISSUES IN POLITICAL CAMPAIGN?

(Continued from Page One) will be made this year by Granville county, but there has been little political activity thus far and any aspirants are keeping under cover.

Senator John L. Bailey, of Elm City, representing the sixth district, has announced his candidacy for the nomination to succeed himself. Reduction in land taxes seems likely to be the principal issue in the district.

Representative F. S. Spruill, of Nash county, will not seek reelection, nor has any candidate come forward definitely.

Representative E. J. Woodley, of Moore county, will not seek to resume his seat in the House from the 12th district. He will have two opponents, both ex-senators.

Representative T. S. Kittrell, of Vance county, will retire without contest, explaining that due to the expense of attending a session and the time lost from business, a young man cannot afford to attend more than one session, unless he has an independent income.

Representative W. S. Caulter, of Alamance county, will not be a candidate; nor will Representative W. D. Prudden, of Chowan county.

Representative Lawrence Wakefield, of Caldwell county, will seek to retain his seat and has heard of no opposition to date.

Representative B. T. Falls, of Cleveland county, will stand for re-nomination and expects no opposition.

Representative H. G. Connor, of Wilson county, has announced his candidacy, as has Representative N. A. Townsend, of Harnett county.

Representative Townsend probably will be opposed by Mack M. Jernigan, of Dunn, Harnett county.

Representative R. O. Everett, of Durham, has made no announcement, but it is probable that he will again be a candidate.

As to the matters to come before the 1927 legislature, the predictions of the members of the 1925 General Assembly include: capital punishment; an anti-ecology law; a workmen's compensation act; road bond issues; the Australian ballot; additional responsibility for the executive departments of the State government by making more of the high offices appointive; revision of the present system of taxation; the eight months school term; revision of the constitution to give more elasticity to courts and solicitors and, of course, appropriations.

Revamping of the present system of county government over the state is arousing some little interest in Durham county, according to Senator Foshee, with considerable sentiment for an officer who, as expert and engineer elected by the board of county commissioners, will be responsible for the business and financial operations of county affairs.

Inequality of assessments also is a live issue in Durham county, both as between counties and between the various classes of property.

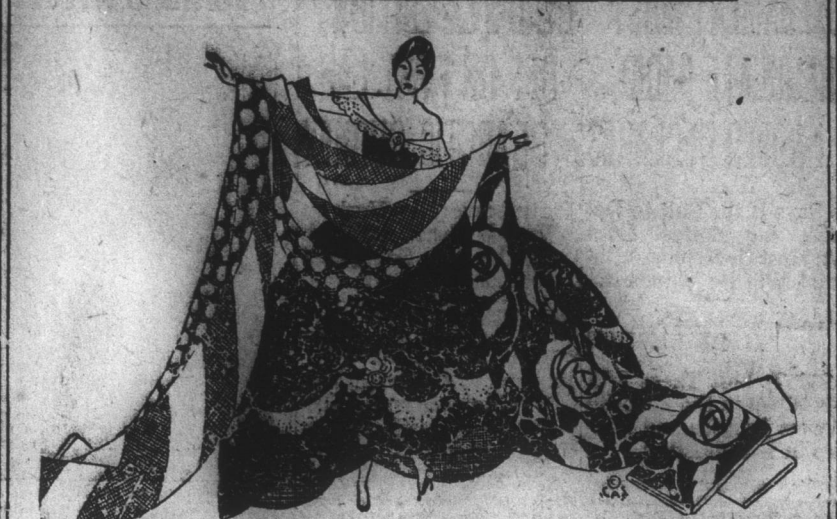
BENJAMIN F. BLALOCK 'DIED AT HOME HERE' Funeral Services Held This Afternoon and Interment Made in Oakwood Cemetery. Benjamin F. Blalock, aged 65, died at his home in this city Monday afternoon at 1:40 o'clock, after an illness of several months. He had been in declining health for several years and his death was hastened by a stroke of apoplexy which he suffered about two months ago.

Funeral services were held at the home on Peach street this afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. A. T. Higgins, who was assisted by Rev. R. S. Arrowood. Interment was made in Oakwood cemetery.

Mr. Blalock was born in Stanly county on February 17, 1861, but had been a resident of Concord for a number of years. He was widely known and highly respected in a wide circle of friends. He was a member of the Forest Hill Methodist Church.

Surviving are his wife and the following children: Mrs. W. A. Ballard and Mrs. Zeb Calloway, of Concord; M. Mrs. N. C. Hopkins, of Charlotte; M. B. Blalock, of Union county; and W. C. Blalock, of Danville, Va. Twenty-eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren also survive.
