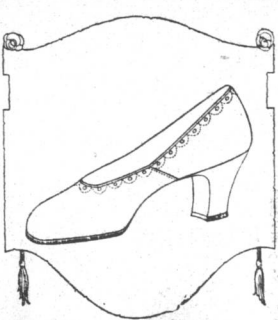

Reno's Divorce Upp. Over 800 divorces were obtained last year at Reno, Nev., one of the greatest divorce mills in the country. This is about 50 more than the number granted in 1924. Nearly 500 of the cases were pressed by wives. Children affected by the court actions numbered 530. As usual, most of the divorces were obtained by persons temporarily sojourning at Reno with the express purpose of getting a divorce.

Post and Flag's Cotton Letter, New York, April 6.—If there has been any real change in the essential character of the market it is not visible to the naked eye. Resistance to more than trivial change in either direction seems equally stubborn.

Selling by speculative interests was somewhat more aggressive in the early trading today, being chiefly directed at new crop months, but although prices yielded a little they steadied again as soon as offerings tapered off and it was obvious that a stronger long interest there may be too strong to be readily dislodged. Talk of curtailment by southern mills to keep production strictly within the limits of actual requirements is again heard and probably has some foundation in fact as there is no apparent disposition among buyers to anticipate in any large way their probable later requirements and demand remains of the filling in character through frequent repeat orders for immediate shipment. It is authoritatively denied that there is any accumulation of goods.

Preparations for the next crop are much behind last year which lends added force to the official warning that a severe winter is likely to befall. The quantity of cotton to be planted is not yet known but it is expected that the crop will be late and the weather damp and cool. Recent developments indicate that the average last year was much overestimated and that a revision of yields per acre since 1900 will be necessary.

The spot situation holds well in spite of the bearish tendency of statistics. The impulse that will break the market off this but is no doubt on the way but no one seems able to tell from what quarter it is likely to come or what its character will be.

CONFESSES PLOT TO BURN THEATRE

Young Winston Man Thought It Would Be Nice Way to Lessen Competition.

Winston Salem, April 6.—In connection with an alleged conspiracy to burn the Victory Theatre in Mount Airy, Ralph Rothrock, young white man of this city, was arrested by Mount Airy police and made a signed confession of the alleged plot to burn the playhouse. The confession was made and signed in the office of Chief of Police J. A. Thomas, in this city and in the presence of Chief Thomas and the chief of the fire department of Mount Airy.

According to Rothrock's sworn statement he worked for some time at the Victory Theatre in Mount Airy, but about three weeks ago he came back to this city. It was by request, he stated, that he came here, and he said that he wrote a letter to P. A. Boone, owner of the Broadway Theatre in Mount Airy, asking Boone if he didn't want him to burn the Victory Theatre.

After returning to this city, Rothrock states he wrote the letter to Mr. Boone, signing it "Ned Nye." The letter, which was exhibited in the office of Chief Thomas, stated in detail that the writer would burn the Victory Theatre for Boone, if he so desired, for the sum of \$500. He explained in the letter that it would help Mr. Boone's business and pointed out other attractive ways that the burning of the Victory would aid Mr. Boone in the conduct of his own theatre.

Receiving the letter, according to information from the Mount Airy authorities, Boone turned it over to the police, who instructed him to answer the letter, telling "Nye" that the proposition would be considered and requested that he come to Mount Airy. This he did.

"Nye," alias Rothrock, states that he went to Mount Airy and that it was in conversation with Boone at this time that the latter told him that he did not do business in that way and had no desire to have his competitor burned out. Rothrock stated that he went to Mr. Marion, the owner of the Victory Theatre, and told him that he feared a conspiracy to burn his theatre.

The conversation with Marion occurred about two weeks ago, he stated, and he came back to this city and did not hear anything further until his arrest last night.
