The governor has been e'eminently
fair in his remarks," the speaker said,

The governor, Mr. Barringer said,
has eliminated representatives of labor when their time expired from
the directorates of a number of State

He also criticined the action of Cor-

son. He also criticised the action of Governor McLean in the recent controversy over the survey of women in industry, saying there was no reason why the state should not have permitted the agency set up by the federal government to make the survey. The present commissioner of labor and printing, the speaker said, has been also "openly antagonistic to the labor movement by publishing mispleading articles in the state press relative to wages paid in the dominant industries."

LIZARD DOWN BACK
CREATES WILD STIR

Committed Among Negroes at Brown
Summit Station When Lizard Runs
Amuck.
Greensboro News.

A lizard minning down the back of a negro woman at Brown Summit Sunday caused considerable commotion at the station there, just as a train was pulling in headed for Greensboro. There was a big group of negroes waiting for the train, sitting on a grassy plot near the station, and the lizard had played around on the grass and then slipped down the back of the dress of a woman.

The negroes scattered right and left, while the screams of the victim were heard above the roar of the approaching train. Her companion was endeavoring to assist her get rid of the lizard, while she shouted that the thing would kill her.

Magistrate 'S. S. Mitchell, of this city, who had made a visit to Brown Summit, was among the few witte people at the place who were boarding the train to return home and unfortunately the party had to get on before the outcome of the matter could be learned. As they got on the train the woman was still screaming and the negroes trying to get out of her way and so avoid the lizard bopping on them was a greater display of agility than any Can-leston contest, he said.

The negroes had been attracted to Brown Summit by two big revival meetings at negro churches nearby.
