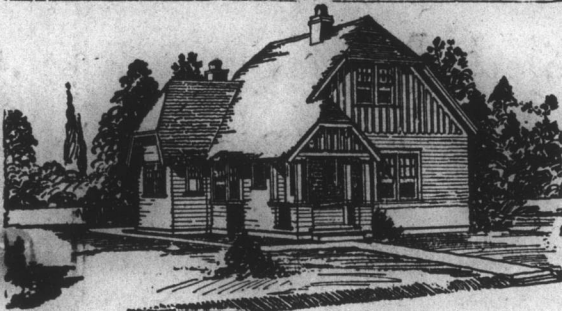

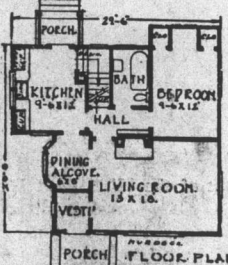

Post and Flag's Cotton Letter. New York, Aug. 20.--As natural just prior to a cotton report, trading has been rather perfunctory as all prefer to await the figures for what to expect when they confirm or refute private advices respect to deterioration due to recent weather conditions.

Some of these private advices have not fallen far short of being sensational but the tendency is always to suspect that they contain more or less exaggeration and reflect local conditions rather than that of the belt as a whole or may even be warped by the market position of the sender.

Many of the bullish advices the last few days, however, have come from sources which are above any suspicion of that sort and although they have not stimulated demand powerfully as yet and may not be exactly in line with what is shown by the official verdict, there is a growing feeling that they are based on facts and that the way is being paved for a possible later downward revision in official figures quite as sharp as the upward revision which started the trade last year. Deterioration once started in a crop so deficient in many ways as that of this season may spread with surprising rapidity and beyond any expectation.

The belief in lower prices which is still noted in some trading circles is founded upon the acreage and the carryover, neither of which is particularly reliable. If prices give way on the figures Monday it will look like a good chance to buy.
