The Deadly Curve. Statesville Daily.

"The car failed to take the curve" is the explanation of the tragedy near Newton, which cost three lives. And, as all car drivers know, failure to take a curve usually means that the speed was too high. It doesn't always mean that the driver is negligent or reckless—habitually. It is often the most careful drivers, attention temporarily diverted, run on a curve before they are aware of it. The guiding hand temporarily relaxed through inadvertence, may fail to give the steering wheel the proper turn at the right instant; or it may be—and generally is—that the speed is too high. In either tragedy is not only possible but probable. A of which is but another of thousands of tragedies that bear mute testimony to the absolute necessity of care in the operation of motor cars. But the greater tragedy is that the disasters that wreck do not seem to impress others. There is no perceptible diminution in the number of casualties; on the contrary they increase.

Why Girls Smoke. Chicago, Sept. 3.—A desire to be smoking prompts young girls to smoke and drink. Mrs. Alfreda J. Howell of New York, special counselor to high school girls, said today in an address before the Illinois Vigilance association: The custom of "putting" which she traced to modern literature and the movies is more dangerous, she said.
