

**WAS ON MIAMI BEACH DURING ENTIRE STORM**

Tiller F. Thacker Remained in House Until it was Nearly Destroyed.

With water from the Atlantic Ocean and then Biscayne bay gradually tearing away his house, starting with the sleeping porch, and forced to pile all his furniture against the doors on the windward side of the house to keep them closed or save the home from demolition, one Greensboro man was forced to spend the first night of the recent hurricane and until 10 o'clock on the following morning in the house that was being wrecked.

Life guards called to assist various members of the family to a nearby hotel and let him shift for himself. That, brief, was the experience of Tiller F. Thacker, former Greensboro man, now a resident of Miami Beach, during the Florida hurricane of a week ago.

"But for the fact that the Belvedere hotel was located within a very short distance of our house, we might all have died," said Mr. Thacker last night as he discussed his experience during the storm, which first struck Friday night, abated, and then attacked from another direction. The first attack removed the sleeping porch to the house occupied by Mr. Thacker and family, and the second, soon after they left it, completed the work of wreckage.

Nine ropes, lifeguards removed Mrs. Thacker, his wife, and his mother, of this city, there on a boat. They were taken to the Belvedere hotel where from 10 o'clock on the morning of the second phase of the storm they remained until Wednesday. Being in one room all the while and unable to leave the island, Mr. Thacker as employed in the engineering department of the Florida West Coast Railroad company, and it was due to a pass that company furnished all employees that he was finally enabled to leave the island last Wednesday and pass over the Venetian causeway to the mainland. The municipal causeway was closed, Mr. Thacker said.

The Venetian causeway was part-

ly blocked by automobiles that had been overturned and boats that had been washed upon it by the force of the hurricane. Red Cross workers were very much on the job with coffee and food and water was selling for 5 cents per glass, such as it was, Mr. Thacker said last night.

As for leaving the house once the storm was underway, Mr. Thacker said that meant certain death. Water from the ocean swept over the key, and it was during a slight abatement that guards got busy and removed his family to the hotel where they were much safer. "I saw plenty of dead people washed up but I didn't see any killed."

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
