

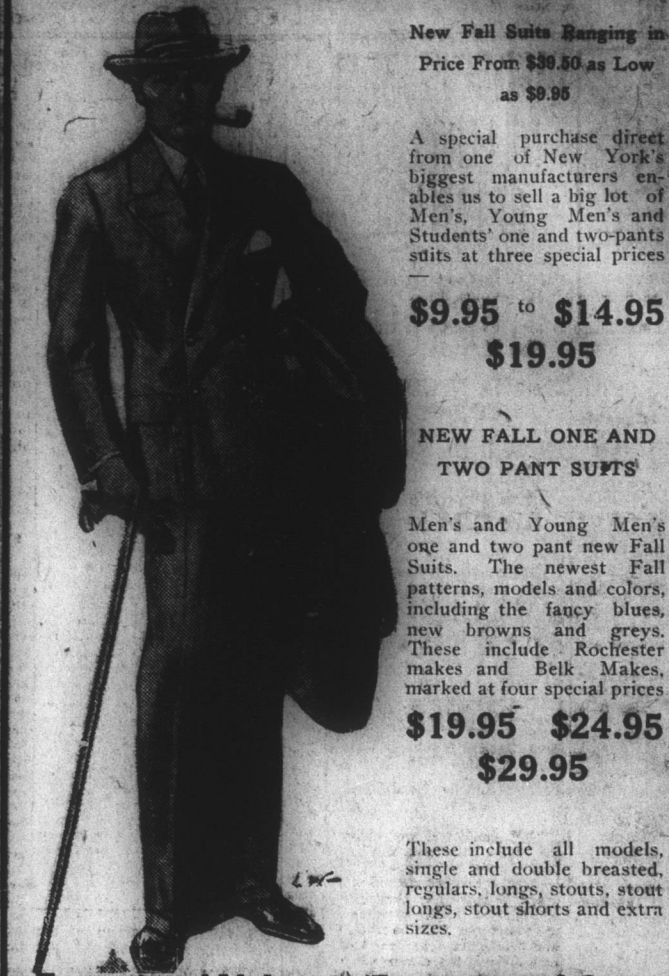

IN AND ABOUT THE CITY

ADVANCE AGENT FOR FAIR SHOWS ARRIVES
Says Midway Shows and Rides Will Be Far Superior to Any Yet Shown Here.
B. O. Stephenson, advance man for the Bernard Greater Shows, which will occupy the Midway at the Cabarrus County Fair this year, arrived in Concord yesterday with high praise for the show he represents and predictions for a great fair in Concord.
Mr. Stephenson's show has played many of the big fairs in the east and north this season and proved so successful that return dates were sought in many of the cities. The show this week is playing the Virginia State Fair at Richmond.
The Rochester Exposition, the New York State Fair at Syracuse, the New Jersey State fair and several of the largest fairs in the state of Pennsylvania this year offered the Bernard Greater Shows on the midway. The reputation of the show has spread so that it has been booked for a number of Canadian dates next year.
"We are offering 21 shows this year and they are all different from anything shown here," Mr. Stephenson said. "In addition we have the various rides that so appeal to all youngsters and many grown-ups."
One of the most interesting features of the show, it was pointed out, is the race of motorcycle riders against a lion which is turned loose in the enclosure. Such a feat as this has never before been offered in Cabarrus county.
The road to the fair grounds has been reworked by the county highway department and is in excellent shape. The road from Long's Filling Station to the entrance to the grounds was plowed up and scraped and already is in excellent condition. When the road was plowed up salt was sprinkled over it and this has been worked into the roadbed. When the road is watered this salt will prevent any dust. This treatment has been given the road each year and has eliminated all dust.
Visitors to the grounds this year will enter only through the main entrance. The other gates will be used only for exits. The main entrance has been widened and all cars can easily be handled there. A one-way road from the upper gate to the main entrance will be laid off and cars leaving the grounds will be routed over the upper road.
Members of Company E, Concord's National Guard unit, will do traffic and police duty this year. The huge exhibit tent, 90x180 feet, is being erected now. It will house auto exhibits arranged around the outer edges with other exhibits in the middle.
Persons with livestock and other exhibits are asked to have them at the grounds no later than Monday afternoon.
COOLER WEATHERS GRETTED WITH WRAPS
Coats and Blankets Order of Night Following Drop in Temperatures.
Without such warning lower temperatures sneaked into Concord last night, resulting in a scurry for heavy coats and blankets.
There was a change in the temperature yesterday afternoon but the change was not especially noticeable until after sunset, when there was a decided fall tinge to the air.
Motorists wore coats and fires were seen burning in a number of homes while blankets were necessary for comfortable sleeping. The lower temperatures are not the result of any storm or unusual weather phenomena but come as a warning of the approach of Fall and continued cooler weather.

DETROIT CHURCHES BAR SPEECHES BY UNION MEN
People Say That City Has Outstripped Her Rivals Because She is Led by Labor Organizations.
Detroit, Mich., Oct. 6.—Delegates to the forty-sixth annual convention of the American Federation of Labor assembled for their fourth business session today with the knowledge that pulpits of the Protestant Churches of Detroit were closed to their leaders.
Unofficial advices say the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America will prohibit Ministerial Association members of the Y. M. C. A., has been declining invitations to volunteer leaders to fill Detroit pulpits next Sunday.
William Green, President of the Federation of Labor, issued a formal public statement charging the revocation was inspired "through the influence of the Detroit Chamber of Commerce and the Building Trades Association."
Spokesmen for the commercial organization answered Green by releasing for newspaper publication an official outline of their position, in which it was requested that "addresses" by men who are admittedly attacking our government and our administration plan of employment be matched by those of "Detroit speakers who will be happy to show that our city has outstripped all her rivals simply because she has been unfettered by labor organizations."
