DAVIDSON REVAMPS GRID SCHEDULE FOR NEW YEAR
Old foe, Presbyterian College, Has Been Dropped—Citadel and Florida Now on Schedule.

One old and one new foe were dropped by the Davidson College athletic officials in preparing the 1927 football schedule. It is believed the new arrangement will provide more entertainment for more fans, thereby increasing gate receipts and at the same time putting the Wildcats on a little stronger circuit.
The old foe dropped is Presbyterian College and the new one dropped is Hampden-Sidney. To replace these the Davidson board has scheduled games with Citadel and Florida.
The Davidson-Presbyterian game has been played heretofore for the benefit of Presbyterians in the two Carolinas. The teams have been playing for years with Davidson winning a majority of the games. Last year and again this year there were charges of unnecessary roughness against P. C. players, the charges culminating this year in the assertion that one of the P. C. players struck an official in the heat of passion during the game. This attack no doubt had something to do with the change in the Davidson schedule.
Davidson athletic officials no doubt heard also, that in their game with Furman two P. C. players had to be put off the field for roughness.
Hampden-Sidney was successful against the Presbyterians in the two games played. Last year the teams played to a 6-6 draw and this year the Death Valley team won 12 to 0. However, Hampden-Sidney has few followers in this part of the world and no doubt either of the new teams will draw better than this one from Virginia.
Florida has not set the woods on fire this season but just the same football teams from that institution have gained national reputation in recent years and Davidson strengthened her schedule by signing with the Gators instead of the Rebels. No doubt the presence of a Florida team in North Carolina would draw a big crowd, no team from that institution ever having played in the Tar Heel State.
Certainly the Citadel team should prove as popular as the team from Presbyterian College. This game has always been played in South Carolina, where are harbored more Citadel fans than P. C. alumni. Too, the Citadel has been turning out fast moving teams in recent years and the team this year is fighting for the State championship. No doubt when the Bull Dogs and Wildcats meet there will be fan aplenty.

RENE ADORCE'S CHOICE WARDROBE

AIR MAIL ROUTE MAY PASS THROUGH CITY
One of Suggested Routes From New York to Florida Would Offer Service to This City.
Announcement from Washington that an air mail route would be established soon between New York and Atlanta is of much local interest due to the fact that one of the proposed routes would carry the planes over Concord.
Three routes have been suggested, say Washington reports, and officials are inclined to the route via Greensboro, Salisbury, Concord, Charlotte and Greenville, S. C., because of the density of the population along the line.
However, it is said this route carries dangers to aviators due to terraced lands which make emergency land fields scarce.
Another of the routes is via Roanoke, Chattanooga and Atlanta and while that section is not so thickly populated it is said there are many fields along that route that could be used for emergency landings.
Air mail service would greatly facilitate the handling of mail from and to New York and other points in the east and north, and naturally this service would be of great benefit to local persons should the route be put through the Piedmont section.

BIRTH CERTIFICATES OF MUCH IMPORTANCE
Parents Should See That Physicians Report Births to Proper Authorities.
Birth records are becoming more and more important in North Carolina and parents should see that births of their children are reported to proper authorities, W. M. Sherrill, registrar of vital statistics for Concord, stated today.
"It is the duty of the attending physician to report all births," Mr. Sherrill stated, "but a survey of the records since 1914 shows that there is no official record of many children born in the county since that time. It was in 1914 that North Carolina enacted a law requiring a record of each birth and each death in the state. The importance of the law is evident to those persons who come in contact with it. Almost every day there comes a request from out-of-state people who want copies of the birth certificates of their children. In some states these certificates have to be shown before children are admitted to schools. In some others the nationality of the child has to be proved before certain state benefits can be secured while in others no employment cards are issued except upon information contained on the birth certificate.
"it is only a matter of time, and short time at that before the same condition will exist in North Carolina and then the importance of the certificates will be evident to all. That is the reason parents should inquire about the matter soon after the birth of the child. While a majority of physicians are careful to report all births promptly there are others less careful, and as a result there are no official records of many babies born in Cabarrus in recent years."
J. H. Brown, county welfare officer, is one county officer who knows the importance of the certificates.
"At present," he said, "when parents ask for work cards for their children I require them to produce the family Bible to show the date of birth of the child seeking the card. However, within another year or two this plan can be discarded and we will go to the birth certificate records to get the dates. It is of great importance that a record be kept of every child born in the county."

GAME AT CHARLOTTE THANKSGIVING DAY
Lenoir-Rhyne Meets Roanoke on Turkey Day—Great Interest Being Shown as is Only College Game in This Section.
Local football fans are evidencing interest in the announcement that the Lenoir-Rhyne football team will play Roanoke Thanksgiving Day at Charlotte.
Plans for the game had been under discussion for some time and it was announced Wednesday that a playing field at Charlotte had been secured for Thanksgiving Day.
Since this will be the only college football game in this section, it is expected that a large crowd will witness the contest.
"The Lenoir-Rhyne players have suffered defeat at the hands of Roanoke for two previous seasons and are determined to leave the field as victors. At the first clash between the two the Virginians completely routed the Mountain Bears, and in the second meeting the Virginians won but, according to those who witnessed the game, the Lenoir-Rhyners made a good showing against them.
The Roanoke eleven had won this season from Y. M. L., Hampden-Sidney and Richmond College, while the Mountain Bears have won from Guilford, Elon and others, and were defeated by a score of 6-0 by State.

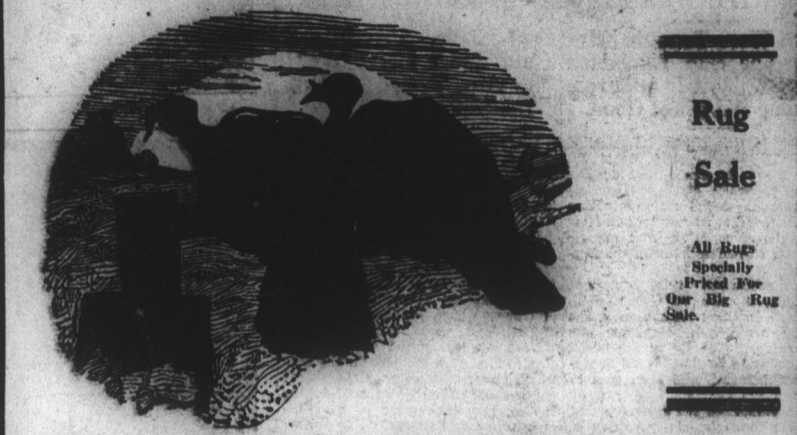
Expect 150 to Attend Father and Son Banquet Friday.

THREE WHITE MEN ARE CHARGED WITH THEFT

It is Alleged They Were Taking Gas From Pump at Oak Grove Filling Station.
Five young white men were placed in Cabarrus county jail here during the night as the result of an alleged theft made on a filling station near Concord late last night. One of the men, Claude Smith, of Concord, was wounded when the night man at the station opened fire on the quintette.
In addition to Smith, those arrested were John W. Smith, of Concord; Bill Edwards, Bill Jones and Nat Strickland, all of Kannapolis.
When seen in the county jail this morning the Smith brothers said they stopped at the filling station to replenish the gas supply in the car in which they were riding. They had a can and were trying to take gas from one of the pumps, they said.
When the night man, John Saunders, opened fire, four of the men dashed away, leaving their wounded comrade. They did not know until their arrest that he had been wounded, they said.
Smith was struck in the back of his head by the bullet from Sanders' pistol. He was knocked down and had no chance to escape. After being carried to the jail his wound was dressed by Dr. Joe A. Hartzell.
When seen at the jail this morning the wounded man said he felt like the bullet was still in his head.
Three times Sheriff Caldwell visited the wounded man in jail and on the last trip he secured the names of the other four men who were with Smith. He immediately arrested them, because he felt that his wound might prove fatal. It was reported this morning that his condition is not serious.
Members of the party said they had been riding and as they had no money decided to get some gas from one of the pumps at the Oak Grove station. Apparently they did not know when Saunders opened fire.
The men will be given a hearing sometime during the afternoon.

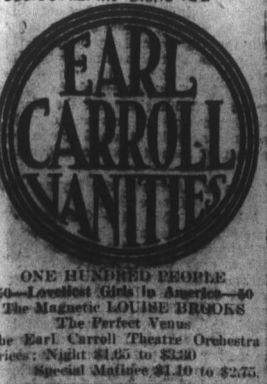
