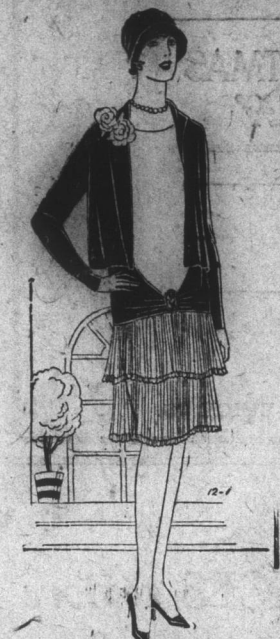

TUBERCULOSIS CLINIC WILL START THURSDAY

Anyone Desiring to Attend Clinic Can Make Appointment by Telephoning County Health Office.
The adult tuberculosis clinic which will be conducted by Dr. S. E. Lee, of the State Sanatorium, assisted by Miss Margaret Ford, Red Cross Tuberculosis Nurse of Cabarrus County, will begin Thursday afternoon at the County Health Office, in the County Building, it was announced today. If there are any adults in Cabarrus County who want to attend the clinic they may make an appointment by telephoning No. 600, Miss Ford said today.

Dr. Lee, assisted by Miss Ford, will complete the clinic among the school children at Kannapolis Thursday morning and the adult clinic for the county will commence at Concord on Thursday afternoon.

A report of the work done in the clinic, both among the school children of Concord and Kannapolis and among the adults will be issued as soon as the adult clinic is completed. It is expected that the report will be ready by December 15th.

ELIAS SHOE KILLED WHEN TRACTOR FALLS ON HIM

Farmer of Mission Neighborhood Crushed to Death When Tractor Turned Over on Him.
Elias Shoe, farmer of the Mission neighborhood, who resides on Mt. Pleasant Route 2, was instantly killed Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock when a farm tractor which he was driving turned over on him and crushed his life out.

The accident, which resulted in the loss of the life of Mr. Shoe, occurred when the plows attached to the tractor became bogged and in an effort to release the plows more speed was given the tractor which caused it to turn over on Mr. Shoe. Mr. Shoe was dead when the tractor was removed from him.

The deceased is survived by his wife and several children.

Details of the funeral arrangements were not known in Concord early today.

1,500,000,000 CHRISTMAS SEALS TO AID TUBERCULOSIS VICTIMS

New York Artist Takes Troubadour Motive From Hospital Practice of Having Singers Cheer Patients.
The artist responsible for the Christmas seal this year is George V. Curtis, of New York, who lived and painted in Paris for thirty years. He got the idea for the three troubadour musicians on the seal from the fact that the New York Tuberculosis and Health Association uses singers in hospitals in treating tubercular patients who tend to become pessimistic under the regime of absolute rest in bed. This year one billion five hundred million Christmas seals are being distributed everywhere throughout the country by 38,000 volunteer workers to raise money to fight tuberculosis in their home districts.

VALENTINO IN "THE FOUR HORSEMEN" AT CONCORD

Second Release of One of His Greatest Pictures to Be at Concord Theatre.
What is considered by many critics as one of the best motion pictures that has been made to date, and what without doubt is the best picture that Rudolph Valentino ever acted in, will be shown Thursday and Friday at the Concord Theatre. The picture is "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse."

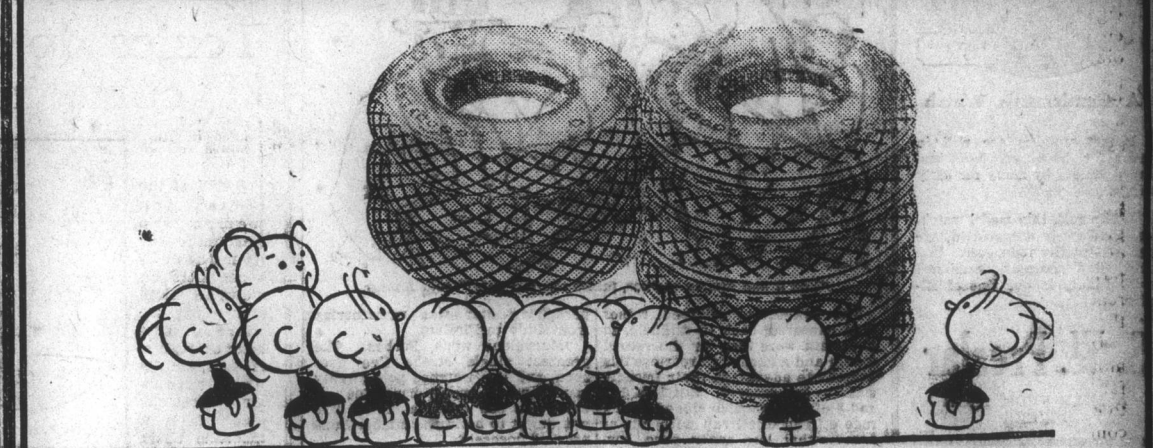
