Our Billion Dollar Junk Business.

In this country there are some 48-10 in individuals and firms doing a billion dollar wholesale business in waste material of all sorts. These materials include waste paper, paper stock, woolen rags, rubber, old metal, scrap iron, cotton and wool waste. The purchases of waste paper alone, to be manufactured into paper, total over \$75,000,000 a year. According to C. M. Haskins, secretary of the National Association of Waste Material Dealers, the number of junk dealers who go from house to house cannot be estimated. The past decade, he says, has witnessed a tremendous growth in this industry. The annual turnover is estimated at between \$2,500,000,000 and \$3,000,000,000,000. The great bulk of waste materials is collected at the sources of manufacture and in the cities. "Nothing is thrown away," Haskins says. "Everything that can be re-manufactured is brought back to the mills." Auto manufacturers claim that approximately 1,900,000 autos will be junked this year on account of old age, accidents and other causes.
