TAX REDUCTION APPEARS SURE

President Gives Reasonable Assurance of Slash at Next Session. Washington, March 18.—President Coolidge today gave reasonable assurance that a tax slash will be made at the next session of Congress. America's phenomenal prosperity will undoubtedly warrant such a tax reduction, visitors at the White House were told.

By request of the President, the House Ways and Means Committee will make a summer survey of general business conditions and of the possible Government receipts for the fiscal year which will begin on July 1st. By November, the survey will have been completed and an Administration Tax-Slash Bill is expected to be ready for presentation when the new Congress begins his session. As the result of these complete arrangements, Congress will be in shape to reduce the tax rates before the next new levies fall due, the President expects. He hopes that the business and industrial interests of the nation will thus be enabled to adjust their affairs to another year's continuance of the bounding prosperity.

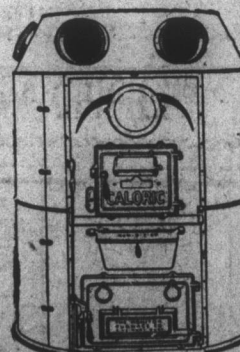
