Representatives from State Colege and the State Department of Agriculture were present and pledged their co-operation in the rganization, erection and operation of the proposed REA plant and marketing center.

The selection of 15 incorporators was made at the suggestion of the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington. These men are to proceed with the organization of the corporation and with the soliciting of additional applications for mem-

bership. Following this further plans to submit formal application will be made, and include a map of the county, showing highways, railroads, location of farms belonging to members and other information about them.
