#### Large Group Of Married Men To Leave For Army

Around 200 In Group Which Leaves Here Latter Part Of Next Week

A large group of approximate-ly 200 Ashe county men will leave here the latter part of next week for pre-induction examinations preliminary to entering the armed forces.

The local draft board announced that around 85 percent of this group were married, many of whom are fathers. The remaining 15 percent are single men.

It is expected that the American Legion and Rotary club will have a special departure service and as usual, those leaving will be presented military manuals as well as some type of re-

freshments or cigarettes. A list of those leaving will be published later.

#### Waste Paper Is To Be Collected In Ashe County

B. H. Duncan Is Chairman; Schools To Co-operate In Countywide Plans

Professor B. H. Duncan, principal of the West Jefferson High School, who has been named as chairman of the Waste Paper Salvage Drive in the county, announced yesterday that the central schools in each district would be used as collection points and that the principal in each of these schools would serve as chairman of his district.

All available waste paper is to be collected at the central schools and then sent to West Jefferson. The Todd Drug Company is cooperating in the drive and will allow its building to be used as the collection point here, for baling and shipping the paper, Mr. Duncan said.
