Stalin's Announcement Followed On Heels Of Close Of Big Three Meeting

Russia's official declaration of war against Japan, following America's initial use of the powerful atomic bomb, led news commentators and others to predict the war with Japan much nearer an end than was prophesied a short time ago.

The announcement of Russia's stand was first expected to be made during the Big Three conference, which has just ended. And following on the heels of this momentous meeting, it came as a small surprise to leaders. The official announcement was made yesterday by Premier Sta-

In addition to the Atomic bomb, all other war efforts in the Pacific have been going ahead this week with the American forces. Gen. Carl A.
