NOW IS THE TIME TO BUILD ROADS

We have read the newpapers and listened to our good friend, Grady Cole, broadcast relative to road conditions with great interest. Mr. Cole points out that the Eastern part of the state has received the larger part of the road funds, which I suppose is true.
