#### Some Beans Are **Being Bought By** Gov't On Marts

Representatives Of Market-ing Division Are Here This Week

Several thousand bushels of beans have been bought on the local markets this week, by representatives of the marketing division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. These beans have brought \$1.35 per bushel loaded in cars and have netted the growers from \$1.00 to \$1.10.

It could not be learned how many beans, representatives of the marketing division are prepared to buy. Their purchases this week, however, have helped greatly to take care of beans, which in many cases could not have been sold, it was pointed

Officials of the two local markets said that they again wished to advise the farmers not to pick beans too full for marketing purpose. A number of these have been turned down.

The volume on the local markets this week has been lighter than usual. Prices on better beans average around \$1.00 per bushel, it was announced.
