

Figures reveal that last year's enrollment was well over 5,000 and it is estimated that it will show an increase this year, when the first World War II babies will enter. All school patrons are invited to attend the opening sessions of the various schools on the opening day, Monday.

Most of the teaching positions have been filled, Superintendent A. B. Hurt said and the remaining openings are expected to be supplied before Monday. Buildings are being put in readiness for the opening, too, he stated.
