AMERICANS FIGHT COMMUNISTS IN KOREA Smith Wins For Senate; Graham Carries County

Smith Sweeps East In Second Primary On Sat.

Voting In County Heavier Than In First Primary; Local Interest Keen

Willis Smith won the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator in the run-off primary against Senator Frank Porter Graham on Saturday by more than 20,000 votes according to unofficial returns. Smith's total was 277,672 to Graham's 257,156 in North Carolina.

Ashe county along with a big majority of other Western coun-Lies gave Senator Graham, a big majority, however. The total official vote in this county was 1699 for Graham; while Smith took less than half of that, 765. Three precincts in this county, Horse Creek, Hurricane and Laurel gave Smith no votes. The total votes by precinct is published elsewhere in this paper.

In the county there was an increase in voting over the first Primary. The first time Graham received 1350 votes, Smith 413, Reynolds 91 and Boyd 1. There was only a total of 1854 votes Kannapolis Man cast in comparison to 2464 on Saturday.

In the first primary in the State Graham poled 303,605 votes to Smith's 250,222, when Smith was more than 53,000 behind.

MacArthur Puts Weight Against Northern Forces

State Department Appeals To Russia To Call Off Korean Invaders

Washington - The cold war ook on hot, firey sparks Tuesday as President Truman ordered U. S. planes into the fight of South Korea against the northern communist invaders.

The United States Security Council gave its approval to the ection and General Douglas Mac-Arthur pushed the full strength of his air force and his naval forces into the fray with lightning speed when he received President Truman's historic order that the little republic of South Korea should be given the only kind of aid that could save

Within a matter of hours an advanced air base was set up at Fukuoka, on the west coast of Japan's Kyushu Island across the strait from Korea.

At dawn Wednesday the planes started roaring across the Korean battle front some 350 miles the northwest.

As their operations got fully under way telephone communication with Seoul was suddenly cut again. Contact was lost after 8 a. m. (5 p. m. e. s.t., Tuesday). At 10:30 a. m. (8:30 p. m. e. s. t.) it was still out. Overseas operators said, it was assumed the Over 400 Bushels Sold Since lines had been cut
