The charter granted by the Legislature to the railway from Danville southward to Yanceyville and Mebane allows its extension to Pittsboro, the county-seat of Chatham.

It is said by the people who ought to know, that since December 15th last, at the very least, 9,500 to 10,000 negroes have left the State, of which number 1,009 have gone to Kansas.

The election bill which was passed by the Legislature is no such bug-bear as the Republicans attempt to make it appear. It really amends the present law in few particulars, and is the compromise bill or substitute for the measure which passed the Senate.

The matter of registration in this State will not in future be loosely looked after. The new election law provides that no registration shall be valid unless it specifies as near as may be the age, occupation, place of birth, and place of residence of the elector.

The Legislature in joint session last Friday night elected about 2,200 magistrates to fill the places of those whose terms expire in August next.

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Confederate Pension Bill.

The Confederate pension bill as it finally passed the Legislature provides for the payment annually: 1. To such as have received a wound which renders them incompetent to perform manual labor in the ordinary avocations of life, and to all other soldiers who are otherwise disabled from performing manual labor by reason of wounds received during the war, one hundred dollars.

To such as have lost a leg above the knee, or an arm above the elbow, seventy-five dollars.

To such as have lost a foot or leg below the knee, or hand or arm below the elbow, or have a leg or arm rendered useless by reason of a wound or permanent injury, fifty dollars.

To such as have lost one eye, and to all needy widows remaining unmarried, twenty-five dollars.

To an officer, sailor or widow holding a national, State or county office, which pays annually a salary or fees, the sum of three hundred dollars, or who owns in his or her own right, or in the right of his wife, property of the value of five hundred dollars, as assessed for taxation, or who is receiving aid from the State under any act providing for the relief of soldiers who are blind or maimed, shall be entitled to any of the benefits of the act.

For the purpose of paying the pensions, a tax of three cents on every hundred dollars worth of real and personal property of the State, and also a tax of nine cents on each taxable poll or male between the ages of twenty one and fifty years, is hereby applied to this special subject, the same to be collected and paid into the State treasury by the sheriff as other State taxes.

The provision thus made is probably the very best that could be done under existing circumstances.
