We learn that Mr. N. N. Tuck, of this county, is a candidate for Sergeant-at-Arms of the United States Senate. It is claimed by the Populists that they hold the balance of power in the next Senate, and it is believed that they will aid the Republicans in organizing that body when they again meet. This is a pretty high position, but one which most any one would be glad to see come to Person county.

Under the Revenue Act the poll tax is \$1.24, the State tax 21 1/2 cents, the pension 3 1/2 cents, the schools 16 cents, on incomes and gross profits from property not taxed 5 per cent, and on gross incomes derived from salaries and fees 1-2 per cent, on excess over \$1,000 to \$5,000, and 1-2 per cent between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

Last night at the Populist caucus, Otho Wilson, who has become so widely known throughout North Carolina on account of his Gideonite principles, was nominated to be Railroad Commissioner to succeed Mr. Mason.

This is probably the last week of the Legislature, and they are rushing things with a whoop. Especially is this the case in making new offices—every fellow, almost, is on the lookout for a job.

Postmaster General Bissell last week sent in his resignation, which was accepted, and President Cleveland has appointed Congressman Wilson, of West Virginia, to succeed him.

THE FUSIONISTS CONFUSED.

Last night the Fusionists showed, more plainly than ever before, a total want of capacity to legislate and a painful lack of leadership.

The bill creating six new magistrates in every township, and an additional one in incorporated towns, came up for consideration. Senator Moody, who es-ays to be the leader, early displayed great anxiety.

Senators Adams and Dowd called attention to the immense cost involved in the bill in the way of supplying Codes, Acts of the Legislature, Justices' Dockets, &c. They asserted that at the very lowest calculation, the cost would be \$25,000, or \$30,000, and it might reach \$50,000.

Fortune, Candler, and others displayed great feeling and complained that this was not carrying out the promises made to the people, and caucus agreements.

It is gratifying to see that there are some of the Populists who have come to be independent enough to protect and go on record against these old time methods and measures of the Republican party.

In years to come when the school children of North Carolina come to that page in history of their State which reads thus: "In the month of February in this year the House of Representatives adjourned as a mark of respect to Fred Douglas, the well-known negro lecturer and politician, having declined to agree to a resolution of similar import in deference to the memory of General George Washington, the commander-in-chief of the armies of the Revolution and the first President of the United States, and to the memory of General Robert E. Lee, the commander-in-chief of the armies of the Confederate States," what will they think and say? What explanation will be given by their teachers? How will that anomaly of fact be accounted for? The inquiry answers itself.—Norfolk Landmark.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

Closing Hours of the 53rd Congress—Extra Session Talk—Bills Being Rushed Through—New Members Filing Certificates—Senator Ransom and Mexico—Williams vs. Settle Controversy—Postmaster General Wilson—A Virginia Jury Differs from a Washington Jury—Other Points of Interest.

(Special Correspondence of THE COURIER.) WASHINGTON, March 1, 1895.

When the Senate meets at 11 o'clock today it will not adjourn until the clock shows the hour of noon next Monday. Today the naval bill will be discussed, and between now and the final adjournment there will be a number of recesses, but they will not be of long duration.

The appropriation bills are being rushed through with all possible dispatch. The appropriation of this Congress will approximate a total of one billion dollars.

San Francisco, March 2.—The executive has not yet passed upon the sentence of the ex-Queen. It is quite certain that the military commission made it five years and \$5,000 fine.

The future alignment of political parties is giving all thoughtful people much concern. In the next campaign there will be three parties in the field.

The House has positively refused to take up the Williams vs. Settle contested election case. There is no time to "consider" it further.

The only platform reported was this: "The Democratic party, in convention assembled, hail with delight the rapidly increasing sentiment in favor of the restoration of silver to the position it so long held in the monetary system of our country, and unqualifiedly declare in favor of the free and unlimited coinage in silver and gold with full legal tender power at a ratio of 16 to 1, and we invite patriotic citizens of Michigan, regardless of previous party affiliations, to join us in an imperative demand for immediate action to that end, regardless of position of any other nation with respect thereto."

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Senators Who Retire. WASHINGTON, March 2.—When the Senate met at 11 o'clock today it entered upon the last legislative day of the Fifty-third Congress; because, although the Congress does not expire till Monday next at noon its existence till then will be continued by recess, not adjournments.
