COL. BRYAN'S VIEWS.

EXTRACT FROM INTERVIEW WITH HIM YESTERDAY.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Dec. 13.—Colonel Wm. J. Bryan, upon leaving his command, the Third Nebraska Regiment, today, gave the following interview:

"My reason for leaving the army was set forth in my letter to the Adjutant General tendering my resignation. Now that the treaty of peace has been concluded, I believe that I can be more useful to my country as a civilian than a soldier."

Colonel Bryan then proceeded to the discussion of public questions, saying: "The people of the United States having rescued Cuba from foreign control, may now resume the discussion of the domestic problems which confront this nation, and to the consideration of the new questions arising out of the war."

"I may be in error, but in my judgement our nation is in greater danger just now than Cuba. Our people defended Cuba against foreign arms; now they must defend themselves and their country against a foreign idea—the colonial idea of European nations. Heretofore agreed has perverted the government and used its instrumental interferences for private gains; but now the very foundation principles of our government are assaulted."

"The imperialistic idea is directly antagonistic to the ideal and ideals which have been cherished by the American people since the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Our nation must give up her intention of entering upon a colonial policy (such as is now pursued by European countries), or it must abandon the doctrine that governments derive their just powers from the consent of the government."

"We may believe that governments come up from the people or we may believe that governments come down to the people from those who possess the heaviest cannons and the largest ships, but we cannot advocate both doctrines."

"To borrow a Bible quotation, 'a house divided against itself cannot stand,' paraphrasing Lincoln's declaration, I may add that this nation cannot endure half republic and half colony—half free and half vassal. Our form of government, our traditions, our present interests and our future welfare all forbid our entering upon a career of conquest."

"Jefferson has been quoted in support of imperialism, but our opponents must distinguish between imperialism and expansion; they must also distinguish between expansion in the Western Hemisphere and an expansion that involves us in the quarrels of Europe and the Orient. They must still farther distinguish between expansion which secures contiguous territory for future subjugation."

"Jefferson favored the annexation of necessary contiguous territory on the North American continent, but was opposed to wars of conquest and expressly condemned the acquiring of remote territory."

Baron Rothschild Dead.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—Baron Ferdinand James de Rothschild, M. P., is dead.

Baron Rothschild was the second son of the late Alphonse de Rothschild. He married his cousin Eviline, sister of the First Lord Rothschild. He was a member of Parliament, in the Unionist interest, for Aylesbury.

The Baron was an intimate friend of the Prince of Wales. It was during the Prince's last visit to Waddeson, near Aylesbury, the seat of Baron Rothschild, that he injured his knee. The Baron was a lavish host and entertained the Queen in 1890. His death was sudden. It was supposed he was only suffering from a severe cold.

PROGRAM FOR SURRENDER.

Spaniards Will March Out of Havana the Last Day of the Year.

HAVANA, Dec. 21.—The Spanish and American evacuation commissions will hold a joint meeting Friday to arrange a program for the official surrender of the island.

With a view to avoiding brawls and disorders such as occurred at Cerro the other day, General Castellanos has modified the plan agreed upon yesterday for the evacuation of Havana. Instead of partially surrendering the city to the Americans, Spanish troops will be kept here until December 31st and will evacuate the city on the evening of that day. The American commissioners are satisfied with the change of plan, as they would find it difficult to prevent disorders at the borders of the sections of the city held by them and those remaining in the possession of the Spaniards.

CHANGES IN THE CABINET.

SECRETARY BLISS EXPECTED TO RETIRE JANUARY 1ST.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Secretary Bliss has not formally announced his resignation, but intimated to several friends to-day that he intended to resign January 1st. It is authoritatively stated tonight that Secretary Long has determined to resign at an early day, because he prefers domestic life to social obligations here. It is not improbable that these changes will lead President McKinley to entirely recast his cabinet.

Secretary Long's successor will probably be Assistant Secretary Allen. Several are mentioned for Bliss place, but none definitely.

A report is being circulated among the diplomatic corps that Spain will return Polos as Minister when peace is restored. Polo would be regarded as acceptable, despite the prejudice against him inspired by his Canadian spy operations, because he is the only trained Spanish diplomat fitted for the delicate mission by long acquaintance with Americans and favorable personal traits.

NEWS FROM THE STATE.

Items of Interest Throughout North Carolina.

—Mr. J. O. Herring, of Lisbon, made 204 gallons of syrup on one third of an acre, containing 13 rows 76 yards long. This was made of the ribbon cane. The highest stalk was eight feet ten inches.—Clinton Democrat.

—From the report of the State treasurer the Raleigh Post explodes a fusion campaign fallacy. The fusion hand book claimed that the State printing in 1897 cost only \$10,000, compared with more than \$20,000 expended by Democrats. The State treasurer reports that the fusionists spent \$20,497.06 for the printing in 1897.—Winston Sentinel.

—The State pension warrants have all been mailed to the various county clerks. There are over 5,500 of them, and the aggregate amount is \$120,000. They range from \$18 to \$72 a year.

—Gov. Russell has appointed Col. B. S. Royster, of Oxford, adjutant general of the State guard, to succeed A. D. Cowles, now a captain of the first N. C. regiment of volunteers. It is an excellent appointment.

—The adjutant general asks that the annual appropriation be increased to \$20,000, to pay armory rents, insurances, encampments and practice marches. The latter means of instruction is found to be the best and most practical.

—Four thousand and forty-eight dollars worth of revenue stamps appear on a deed of indenture placed in the register of deeds office yesterday. It is a deed of five rods to the Atlantic Coast Line of South Carolina, and was turned over yesterday for proper registration in this

county.—Wilmington Messenger.

—Another of Jim Young's soldiers was killed at Macon, Ga., Thursday. James Ellis, of company I, shot and killed Robert Thomas of the same company, while the regiment was holding dress parade, and then fled. He was soon captured, handcuffed, and is now safe in the guardhouse, and will be tried for his life by court martial. The cause of the shooting was a financial affair.
