LAWTON HURRIES TOWARD MANILA.

FLYING FORCE'S QUICK RECALL.

A BIG FILIPINO ARMY APPEARS NEAR THE PASIG.

CAPTURED LAND SURRENDERED

Lawton Declares That 100,000 Soldiers Are Necessary to Pacify the Islands—Hard to Fight Guerrilla Fashion.

MANILA, April 17.—Major General Lawton's Lake expedition has been ordered to Manila and is now returning.

All the territory taken by him is to be evacuated and the captured launches will be returned to their former owners from whom the Filipinos took them.

SAYS 100,000 MEN ARE NEEDED.

General Lawton authorized the statement at Paete this morning that in the present prospect 100,000 troops will be necessary to pacify the islands.

The difficulties are those of fighting large bands guerrillas in a tropical country. With his brigade he could force his way from end to end of the islands, if he had not to hold the ground traversed, for leaving garrisons behind soon ate up his forces.

He regretted having to evacuate the territory he had taken.

BIG FILIPINO ARMY NEAR MANILA.

Manila, April 16.—During the absence of Major General Lawton's expedition to the Santa Cruz district on the southeastern side of Laguna de Bay, the insurgents have been concentrating at the Northern end of the lake, near Pasig.

The American scouts report that several thousand are already there. General Lawton's expedition is now on its way back.

The telegraph wires to Malolos are down, but matters are quiet with Major General MacArthur.

TROOPS WANT TO QUIT MANILA.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 18.—The desire of the volunteers to return to this country from Manila is evidenced in a report which shows that of those who have been offered opportunity to re-enlist, with the offer of a bonus in travel pay of over \$500. Only about 7 per cent. will accept. The volunteers desire to come home by organizations. General Otis has been disapproving all applications for discharges.

MADRID, April 18.—Gen. Rios, Spain's principal commander in the Philippines, cables that Major Otis has granted him a safe conduct for his chief of staff and another officer whom he is sending to Aguinaldo with a letter demanding the liberation of the Spanish prisoners in the name of humanity and international law.

In the event of a refusal the Commissioners will ask Aguinaldo for a definite decision in order that they may acquaint the civilized world with his attitude. General Rios has empowered them to offer to surrender to Aguinaldo 1600 Filipino prisoners who have been placed at the Spanish commander's disposal by General Otis.

REPUBLICANS 1900 FIGHT.

McKinley and Hobart as The Ticket.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Apparently Governor Roosevelt will not be a candidate for the Presidency or the vice Presidency in 1900. Senator Platt has pledged his support to McKinley through Senator, and the Republican delegation in 1900 from the Empire State will be delivered to McKinley and Garret A. Hobart will have no opposition for nomination in next year's campaign if Hobart is a candidate.

Charles Emory Smith says there is only one speck on the horizon—the controversy over "embolmed beef." This, however, he thinks will be wafted away by the first favorable wind.

Senator Platt says the question of expansion has already been settled by expansion itself, and that it cannot hereafter be made a party question.

The Republican convention in 1900 will not take place until the latter part of July, after the Democratic and Populist gatherings have been held. Senator Hanna, chairman of the Republican National Committee, is averse to a long canvass.

The Executive Committee of the Republican National Committee will be held in Washington soon.

THE SAMOAN MATTER

WHAT THE ATTACK MEANS.

ALL OVERTOPS ALL SUBJECTS IN THE MATTER.

DAILY ONSLAUGHT ON CABINET

The Aim Is to Discredit Von Buelow, Prejudice Public Opinion Against the United States, and Thus Defeat the Meat-Inspection

BERLIN, April 15.—The Samoan question continued to overtop all others during the week. So much so that the interest in the subject has even seized the masses. The most remarkable feature of the affair is united, daily onslaught made by the entire Agrarian, Anti-Semite, and part of the Conservative and National-Liberal press on the Cabinet, and especially on the Minister of Foreign affairs, Baron von Buelow, who is charged with following a vacillating policy and yielding too much to "British insolence and Yankee impudence."

A regular campaign of abuse has been opened against the leaders in foreign politics, many of the utterances being of unusual vigor and venom for German press conditions. It is learned on good authority that the aim of this is to discredit Baron von Buelow with the Emperor, thus force his retirement, prejudice public opinion and Reichstag against the United States, and thus defeat the meat-inspection bill, which is considered by the Agrarians to be too favorable to American and too harmful to German interests.

It is added that Friday's interpellation of the government in the Reichstag on the Samoan question and Baron von Buelow's reply were intended as a test of strength between the two contending parties, as Baron von Buelow, as well as the Cabinet, which is more or less swayed by him, is considered by the Agrarians to be distinctly hostile to their interests.

COMING TO WILMINGTON.

She Will Be There Between the 1st and the 10th.

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Joseph McAllister, chairman of the committee of the Philadelphia Municipal Council, called with other Philadelphians, at the Navy Department today to request that the Raleigh be directed to participate in the Dewey Day celebration May 1st. A promise had already been given that the Raleigh would be ordered to Philadelphia for the Grant Monument ceremonies April 26, and the committee wanted her to stay over. The request was granted.

Secretary Long today directed that after the Philadelphia ceremonies the Raleigh should proceed to Wilmington, N. C., the nearest port to the Raleigh's namesake city, to receive a gift of silver plate. She will leave there in time to reach Charleston May 10, for the local peace jubilee. She will leave Charleston May 14 for the place selected for repairer.

Big Whiskey Combine.

CHICAGO, Ills., April 16.—A special to the Daily News from Louisville, Ky., says the most gigantic liquor combination ever engineered—an amalgamation of whiskey and distillery interests with an united capital of \$200,000,000—will be practically completed to all but the smallest details tomorrow in Chicago when the men now controlling the Kentucky Distilleries and Warehouse Company finish arrangements for the purchase and absorption of nearly every distillery of rye whiskey in the United States.

Secretary Alger Home Again.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Secretary Alger returned this afternoon from a trip through Cuba and Porto Rico. He expressed himself delighted with his experience and prophesied great things for the islands. In an interview he denied emphatically that he had any intent of leaving the cabinet and that the President had never mentioned the subject to him.

Consuls Will Return to Spain.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The Secretary of State has decided to return to their posts in Spain the United States consuls who were obliged to leave on account of the war.

The sub-consular officers mostly remained in Spain throughout the war and were undisturbed, some even continuing to discharge a part of their official duties. They will also be continued in the service.

Spain Intends to be Cordial.

MADRID, April 17.—Duke D'Arcos has been designated Spanish Minister to the United States. He will leave for Washington immediately with his staff. Senor Silvela contemplates reestablishing cordial relations with the United States.

A bank has been organized at Chapel Hill with an authorized capital stock of \$100,000. Colonel Julian S. Carr is president.
