

CENSORSHIP OF WAR NEWS. PROTEST CORRESPON DENTS IN THE PHIPPINES.

Systematic Suppression of Unfavorabls News on the Ground That It Would Set the People by the Ears-Views Published in the United States Not Shared by Officers in the Field.

MANILA, July 17 .- The conditions of the cencorship have been steadily growing worse since the begining of the insurrection and have finally reached a climax. A meeting was held a month ago of all the staff correspondents of American newspapers stationed at Manila and a telegram was drafted presenting the situation according to the concensus of the best opinion and was submitted to General Otis. Robert Westbrooks Drowned.

Being drowned is a horrible way to die, but it was in this way Robert Westbrooks lost his life on Friday evening last. Mr. Westbrooks and three or four other persons were in Barton's mill pond, about four or five miles from town, seining, and after the rest of the party had gone out, Mr. Westbrooks remained in the pond. The party who had gotten out were watching Mr. Westbrook, and thought that he was showing them how to tread water, and was not thinking of such a thing as his being drowned. He remained in the water about two hours before he was found. The remains were buried at the Brooks buryingplace, about three miles from this place. A wife survives him.
