ESOPUS.

MR. EDITOR:—There being some misunderstanding about the Democratic primary in East Roxboro, we desire to give a true copy of the proceedings:

The Democratic primary for East Roxboro was called to order by N. Lunsford, chairman. J. E. Tucker was selected as secretary.

The following resolution was introduced:

Resolved, That all qualified white voters who intend to support and vote the Democratic ticket in the coming campaign and election are cordially invited to take part in the Democratic primaries. Done by order of the Executive Committee, at meeting August 15, 1904.

The chair explained it by saying that people who were not going to vote for and support the Democratic ticket, national, State and county, were not expected to take part in the primary.

George Harris asked for poll of the primary for the Legislature. Result: Cunningham, 50; Street, 10.

Moved by Abner L. Clayton that delegates for this primary be instructed for W. E. Webb for Registrar of Deeds. Carried.

Moved by W. R. Hambrick that delegates for this primary be instructed to vote for N. S. Thompson for Sheriff.

The following committee was appointed by the Chairman to present names for primary: E. J. Tucker, S. G. Wilkerson, A. M. Burns, A. L. Clayton, P. G. Montague.
