"What the Citizens Say About Bonds For Graded School Buildings."

Dear Sir:

Your letter of the 8th received. In my judgement the Roxboro Graded Schools need much better school buildings, and I think the only way to get new buildings at an early date is to issue bonds. I believe the legislature should grant to the people of Roxboro an election for a sufficient amount of bonds to erect suitable buildings and I do not doubt that such an election will result, as it ought to result, in favor of bonds, provided that the proposed location of the buildings is at all suitable and the people are satisfied that they will get value received for the amount proposed to be invested in a new site.

However, before the election is had, I take it that a mass meeting of the citizens will be held, at which the question pertaining to the new location can be practically settled.

ASK FOR NEW DISTRICT.

Gulford Lawyers Petition Legislature to Make That County a Judicial District.

Greensboro, Jan. 12.—At a meeting of the Guilford County Bar Association this afternoon it was decided to petition the present session of the General Assembly to create a new and separate judicial district of Guilford county. It is believed that the legislature will grant the request. It was first thought best to include another county, but this idea was abandoned. The idea is to allow the judge of the new district to hold court here as much of the time as is necessary, which will probably be all of the time and if not, to go to other counties where dockets are congested to spend the other part of his time. It is believed that Judge Shaw will be the judge of the district created, and Solicitor Brooks will, it is understood, not oppose the change. This will be his district and some one else will take the remainder of what is now the ninth district, in which J. Crawford Biggs is judge.

A committee was appointed, consisting of A. M. Scales, F. P. Hobgood, Jr., and Judge R. C. Strudwick, to draft a bill providing for the change, and to visit the committee on judiciary in person.
