It is not curious that the present President of the United States, with his great and exaggerated professions of interest in all ethical questions, his inveterate tendency to regard all questions as ethical, even even those of taste, should deliberately and persistently ignore and deny the moral bearings of tariff taxation for the benefit of the few at the expense of the many? And the queerness of such calculated obliquity is the more noteworthy because of the fact that at one time Mr. Roosevelt saw—and, seeing, naturally preached—the injustice and unfairness of the very purpose of protecting and organizing practical effects. But as pointed out so clearly by Governor Folk, the economic vice of the protective tariff is not conspicuous than its violation of equity. Here we are, a nation with immense resources which we are developing with steady determination and energy, with the announced purpose of taking a great part, if possible a dominant part, in the commerce of the world. And we keep in operation a system of obstruction and restriction of commerce of the most rigid, complex, veracious, and costly character.

If it were not for our extraordinary natural advantages, the immense range and variety of the products of our soil and our mines, and the unflagging stream of immigration from our earliest days as a nation, we never could have stood our own efforts to impede trade. Sooner or later the reversal of this absurd policy, the emancipation of our commerce, is bound to be a dominant issue in our politics, and it may be sooner rather than later.
