THE NEXT LEGISLATURE.

DEMOCRATS HOLD THEIR OWN.

Republicans Have Failed to Make Any Material Change in the Way of Increasing Their Membership in North Carolina Legislature.

The above shows that in the election Tuesday the Democrats lost three Senators and the Republicans gained three, making the Democratic majority in the upper house of the 1909 General Assembly 36. The Republicans have gained two districts—the twentieth and thirty-fourth. The twenty-eighth, twenty-ninth, thirty-sixth and thirty-ninth districts had Republican Senators last session and will have again next session. Six Democratic Senators are sent back for another term, but no Republicans.

In the lower house the Democrats have lost but two members, while the Republicans have gained three, Lee county's Representative increasing the m. 120

to 121. There are shifts in several counties, notably Forsyth, Catawba, Cabarrus, Davidson, Stanley and Orange, which counties last session sent Democrats; but the Counties of Clay, Dare, Graham and others have been reclaimed. Sixteen men who served in the now-famous Legislature of 1907 will be there in 1909 on the Democratic side of the house, and four Republicans in their proper places. The complexion is greatly changed, despite these returned Representatives, and no doubt the legislative enactments will bear the imprint of this mutation.

Good Tobacco Selling Well.

The following sales were made at the Hyco Warehouse in Roxboro on Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 9th and 10th.

Jessie Terrell sold a load of lugs at the following prices 116 lbs at \$20; 78 lbs at \$45; 66 lbs at \$41; 130 lbs at \$40; 125 lbs at \$28; 188 lbs at \$27; 62 lbs at \$20. Making an average of \$30.00 clear check.

Morton & Crawley sold 278 lds for \$105.11. Making an average of \$38 00 clear check.

A. E. Newton & Bowes sold 821 pounds for \$151.15. Making an average of \$18.40 clear check.

Dr. Hester sold 653 lbs at \$45; 80 lbs at \$30; 96 lbs at \$27.50; 140 lbs at \$25; 184 lbs at \$20; 70 lbs at \$18; 66 lbs at \$16.75; 82 lbs at \$15.75; 120 lbs at \$14; 380 lbs at \$12. Total 1871 lbs for \$514.52, one load, at an average of \$27.50 clear check, including all grades.

Albert Dunn averaged \$22.50 clear check.

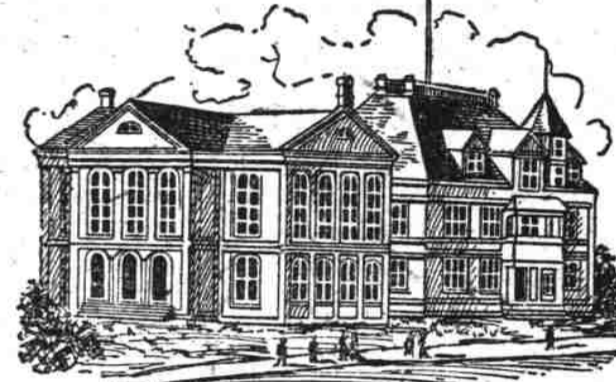
