STATE NEWS.

Items of Interest Gathered from Our Exchanges Throughout the State.

Winston Sentinel: The A. F. Messick Company is now buying about 2,000 bushels of blackberries daily. They are being shipped to Norfolk, Va., and converted into wine. The pickers receive 75 cents a bushel and it is said a good worker can make \$2 a day at this rate.

Rev. John T. Jenkins has resigned the pastorate of the First Baptist church of Wilson and his resignation has been accepted. Some months ago there was a division in the congregation, some of the members becoming so dissatisfied with the pastor that quite a number left the church.

At Gen. J. S. Carr's Occonee-
chee farm in Orange county a few
days ago 980 bushels of wheat
were threshed from 23 acres, an
average yield of about 43½
bushels to the acre. The product
of 107 acres is yet to be threshed
and at the same ratio the yield will
be more than 5,600 bushels.

At the crossing of the Seaboard
Air Line and Southern railway
tracks at Cary, Wake county,
Monday, a Seaboard passenger en-
gine crashed into the middle of a
40-car freight train on the South-
ern. The engine was badly dam-
aged, the car which it struck de-
molished and other cars injured.
No individual was hurt, but traffic
was blocked for some time.

Mr. S. W. Miller, a very pros-
perous farmer who has charge of
Mr. J. W. Lambeth's farm near
Thomasville, raised this year
1,050 bushels of wheat with an
average of 31 bushels per acre and
900 bushels of oats which he raised
on 20 acres. He has had
charge of this farm for four years
and has averaged from 1,300 to
1,500 bushels of small grain per
year besides his corn and cotton
crops. He is considered one of
the most successful farmers in this
section.

Leonard Shaw, the oldest man
living in Wake county, being 96
years old, was arraigned for his
life in the superior court Thurs-
day on the charge of shooting to
death David Hall, who had induced
the old man's grand daughter to
slip away from home to attend a
neighborhood party against his
will. The killing was when the
young people returned late at night
and were trying to get in the
house. The defense will be that
the killing was by someone out-
side of the house inspired by jeal-
ously.

The Southern Railway, so far
has failed to clear Cowee tunnel on
the Murphy division division.
The cave-in occurred more than
two weeks ago and is proving a
troublesome proposition. As fast
as earth is taken out more comes
falling in. The forces are working
day and night, but it is thought
it will be at least ten days before
the tunnel can be cleared. The
people on the Murphy branch are
suffering badly on account of
the lack of freight traffic. Nec-
essities for the people are being
routed by Knoxville, a circuit-
ous way.

The 41st series in the Mechan-
ics' Perpetual Building and Loan
Association will mature Saturday,
Next Wednesday the association
will pay off the series, which
amount to the sum of \$150,300.
Of this amount \$90,300 will be in
money and \$60,000 will be appli-
ed to the cancellation of 73 mort-
gages. This sum total makes a
grand aggregate of \$2,500,000
which has been thus paid out by
this association during its 26 years
of successful history, having can-
celled 2,000 mortgages.—Char-
lotte observer.
