Plans of the American Tobacco Co

Washington, June 17.—it is understood at the department of justice that the American Tobacco Company will not file application for a rehearing in the supreme court as it has permission to do any time before June 29 according to the court's decree.

The company's attorneys will soon have another conference with Attorney General Wickersham at which they will probably submit some plan for reorganization.

PERSON ON TOP.

Prospects for the tobacco crop this year are not particularly good in any section and the total yield will be considerably less than for 1910, when there was an average yield for fairly reasonable prices. South Carolina's expected yield of bright leaf will probably not exceed 30 to 40 per cent. of the normal, while in this State the yield, according to present reports, will not average more than 45 or 50 per cent. Reports received from this County show that the production should be in the neighborhood of 60 per cent. of the normal, or considerably above the average for all sections growing bright leaf, so it is a reasonably safe conclusion that on a fair adjustment of prices the Person county growers should receive this year as much net money for their bright products as they did in 1910. This is good home news, even though it may hurt the other fellows.

FROM THE WOOLY WEST.

Senator LaFollette has come out in the open and says he is a candidate for the presidency on the Republican ticket. He is an insurgent with a considerable following and will probably make himself heard in the convention, but President Taft wants to re-elect himself and will be aided by almost every Federal officeholder in the country, especially by those in the South. It is a curious fact not generally known, that Southern officeholders are in a position to control the Republican party in national convention, and as they are now in favor of Taft for the nomination it is at least fairly probable that they will succeed in placing their candidate at the head of the ticket. But there is an election in November 1912 and Mr. Taft may sit down next day even more heavily than is now his habit.

Laymens Meeting at Providence.

On last Sunday there was an all day meeting at Providence held in the interest of Missions, conducted by the laymen largely. Rev. Mr. Gordon, of Virgilina, is pastor of this Church, and he has done a notable work there during his pastorate. The Church has grown and has gone forward in every good work.

Rev. J. A. Beam, who is spending the summer at his old home at Bethel Hill, opened the exercises with a short talk which was exceptionally good. He was followed by Mr. T. H. Street, who was at his best and made them a strong address, showing the great importance of missions and urging his hearers to go forward and do more for this great cause.

After this address the pastor announced that dinner would be served on the grounds and gave every one present a pressing invitation to join themselves to some table, for there was plenty and to spare. And there was, for we have never seen a greater abundance of eatables considering the number to be fed than was on the grounds.

After dinner the congregation was called together and J. W. Noell spoke to them on the importance of missions and the great work the Laymens Movement had undertaken. After him Pastor Gordon called upon the members of two of his Churches, Providence and Rock Springs, both congregations being represented, to increase their pledges for missions, and a motion was adopted increasing their pledges 50 per cent for the year 1912.

Providence Church is situated in a beautiful grove, an ideal place for a church, the building is neatly painted and presents a pleasing appearance with the surroundings. There was a splendid congregation of splendid people and everybody seemed to enjoy the day. It does one good to get out and mingle with the good people of the country and worship with them, for here it is you find religion good and true. 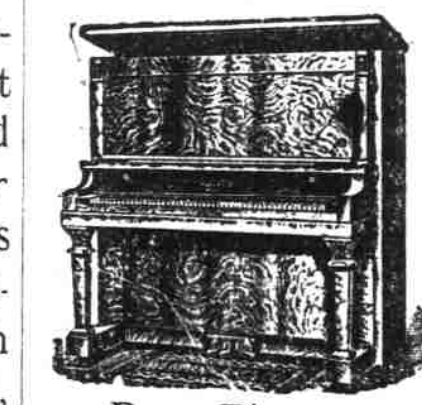
