## LEAD BY OWN GUN.

William A. Graham, of Durham, No Motive for Act.

Sept. 10.—The death of William A. Graham by the hand today gave the people of the rudest shocks that has ever received.

The coroner was quickly called before the body was moved. He found a single empty shell in the revolver and the face of the dead man turned to ward the door. There was no doubt as to the way death came and no action was necessary. The family accepted the verdict of the awful circumstances and an undertaker took charge.

At this time the tragedy is without any explanation. There does not appear to have been any premeditated work about it. Dr. Graham used his own revolver that had been kept about the house. He hadn't been well and it does appear that he was despondent the last few days. Yesterday he was heard to remark, "I am down and out." That was construed to mean that he felt ill. His practice was all that he could have wished, he owned his beautiful home on West Chapel street, he knew that his reputation as a surgeon and practitioner had been made, his family life was avowedly ideal and the town thought most highly of him. The meaning of the utterance has not been caught yet. It is remembered only because it was unusual for him to say such things or feel that way.
