Cupid is claiming a number of the prominent young people of Durham this month, and this is the third Durham couple to be married today. This nuptial had a touch of romance. The approaching affair was absolutely unknown to a large number of their friends in the city, though a few had an idea that it would take place soon without knowing when. The marriage was a quiet one and only the immediate family of the couple was present.

It took place at the home of the brides parents and the old home of the bride, in Roxboro, Rev. Mr. Putnam, pastor of the Roxboro Baptist Church, officiating. Miss Noell was beautifully costumed in a blue going away gown, and she carried a shower bouquet of bride's roses.

It was the intention of the couple to keep the affair a secret for the present, and to arrive in the city on the Norfolk & Wes-

tern this morning at 11 and leave on the Seaboard at 11:05. However, a number of their Durham friends got the secret in some way and were on hand at the station this morning to congratulate them, and give them a shower of rice before they left. They left for Norfolk where they will remain for 10 days, being at home in Durham at the end of that time, at the home of Miss Maggie Holloway, on Cleveland Street.

The couple were two of the most popular young people of the city. Miss Noell is well known and liked by most everyone in the city. As one of the most capable members of the city high school faculty. Want Receiver for His Internal Organ

Baltimore, Md., June 19.—Another step was taken here today in the legal battle of the possession of the vital organs of Edward O. Painter, the Jacksonville, Ill., fertilizer manufacturer who lost his life in the St. Johns River some weeks ago. Attorney of the United States City and Guaranty Company, which issued a large accident policy to Painter, applied for a receiver for the organs which had been sent to Baltimore for chemical examination.

Judge Luffy gave the defendant heirs until next Wednesday to show cause why a receiver should not be appointed. The Guaranty Company alleges that a portion of the viscera had already been turned over to the Painter interests.

Rural Co-operation and Marketing

At last our North Carolina Department of Agriculture is to give adequate attention to the subject of marketing and rural co-operation, in addition to carrying forward the other great work it has heretofore rendered the farmers of the State.

At the meeting of the State Board of Agriculture last week, the editor of this paper introduced a resolution establishing a division of marketing and rural co-operation, to be operated under the joint auspices of the Department of Agriculture and A. & M. College. President H. Q. Alexander, of the Farmers Union, also appeared before the board and strongly seconded the resolution. The board then unanimously approved it and voted an appropriation at the rate of not less than \$5,000 nor more than \$10,000 for the first twelve months. This makes North Carolina the first southern State to establish a marketing division. Now let all the other States follow her good example.—The Progressive Farmer.

We desire to call attention to the advertisement of the State Normal and Industrial College which appears in this issue. Every year shows a steady growth in this institution devoted to the higher education of the women of North Carolina.

Including the Training School and the Summer Session, the college last year had a total enrollment of 1317 students. Eighty-seven of the one hundred counties of the state had representatives in the students body. Nine tenths of all the graduates of this institution have taught or are now teaching in the schools of North Carolina.

The dormitories are furnished by the State and board is provided at a total cost. Two hundred appointments with free tuition, apportioned among the several counties according to school population, will be awarded to applicants about the middle of July. Students who wish to attend this institution next year should make application as early as possible, as the capacity of the dormitories is limited.

The advertisement of the Agricultural and Mechanical College at Raleigh appears in another column. This College is fulfilling its mission as a place of first-class technical training. Turn where you will and its graduates are making their mark on the industrial life of the State. The demands on the institution or men are increasing from year to year. If a young man wants to equip himself for leadership in agriculture, engineering, cotton manufacturing and allied pursuits he should consider the admirable opportunities offered by this university College.

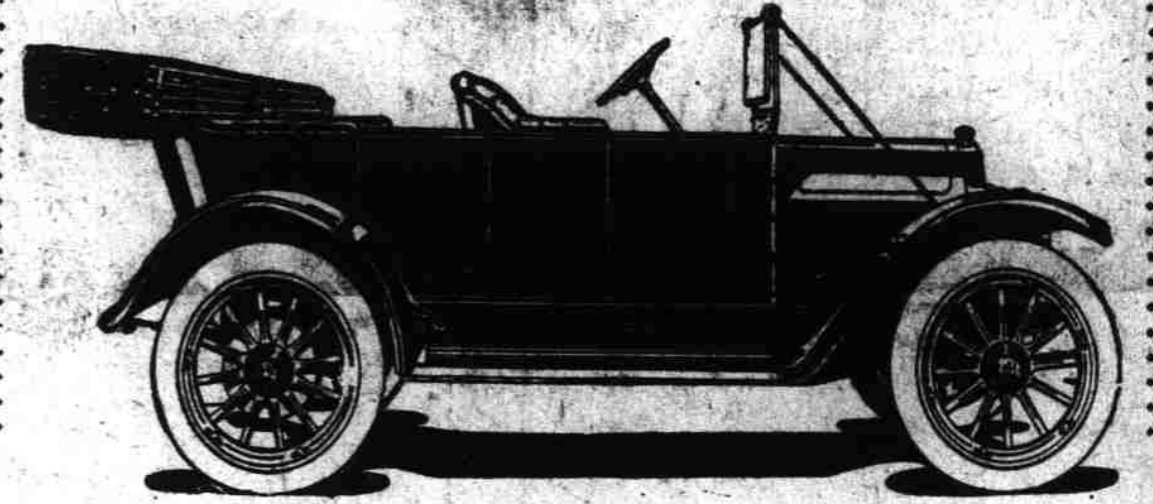
