September 24 is the Date to Consider Railroad Rates and Amendments to the Constitu-

Raleigh, N. C., July 18 .- A prolamation this evening by Governor Craig is for the general assembly to convene in extraordinary session September 24, for a session of twenty days, its purnose being to provide just transportation rates, and adjust relations and obligations between North Carolina and the railroads operating within the State and to "receive the report of the constitutional commission and consider the submission to the people of amendments to the constitution."

Governor Craig says negotations between representatives of the railroad and the corporation commission have not resulted in any understanding sufficiently desinite to delay the call for an extra session. These negotations will not be interferred with by this call and before the meeting of the general assembly on September 24, there is ample time in which to arrive at an agreement. 
