

MITCHELL WINS IN NEW YORK.

Elected Mayor Over All Candidates. Tammany is Downed. Sulzer Goes to the Assembly

New York Nov. 4.—John Purroy Mitchell, fusion candidate was elected mayor of Greater New York today by nearly 100,000 majority over Edward E. McCall, the Tammany candidate. Mitchell's claim that they have elected the entire county ticket along with Mitchell. Indications are that Metz, Tammany candidate for comptroller, has been swamped by Pendergast, the fusion candidate. Former Governor Sulzer is believed to have been elected in the sixth assembly district of Manhattan.

It is believed that the assembly will be strongly republican. Early returns indicate the votes throughout the state have risen in protest against Tammany methods as shown by the electors in favor of the impeachment of Sulzer.

DEMOCRATIC LANDSLIDE.

Baltimore, Nov. 4.—There has been a democratic landslide in Maryland. Bair Lee, the candidate and college mate of President Wilson, has been elected United States senator over Thos. Barran, republican, and George L. Wellington, progressive. He stands committed to carry out the Wilson policies. As the vote went for Lee so did it go for all the other state and city democratic candidates. McNulty, at one time an insurgent, was elected sheriff. Coady, democratic candidate for congress was elected by an overwhelming majority.

WALSH WINS OUT.

Boston, Nov. 4.—David I. Walsh, democratic candidate for governor was elected today

with his entire state ticket, by a plurality estimated at 50,000. The republican party was forced into third place by the tremendously successful campaign of the progressives. Charles Summer Ford, progressive captured second place in the gubernatorial race over August T. Gardner, republican. Governor Forbes, running independently, was hopelessly in the rear.

Shooting Scrape.

On last Thursday there was a shooting scrape which came near ending seriously. Mr. A. L. Bradsher and Mr. Joe Brooks, both of whom live near Bushy Fork, had a quarrel over some trivial matters which resulted in a fight, during which both proceeded to fill the other with lead. Mr. Bradsher using a pistol and Mr. Brooks a shot gun. Mr. Bradsher, who was seriously wounded, was carried to the hospital in Durham on Friday morning where an operation was performed. We learn that he is getting on very well and will be able to return home soon. Mr. Brooks' wounds proved not to be very serious.
