### HON. E. J. JUSTICE IS TENDERED FINE PLACE.

### Offered Position of Special Counsel For the Department of Justice.

When E. J. Justice of Greensboro has been offered a position of special counsel for the department of justice. He will appear here Tuesday morning and will probably be given an assignment at San Francisco in a government suit involving \$2,000,000 to the United States government. Mr. Justice was recommended by Senators Simmons and Overman, Commissioner of International Revenue Osborn and Secretary of the Navy Joseph Daniels. The real power in the movement, however, was Commissioner Osborn, who succeeded in bringing the matter to a close today.

When asked whether he had recommended Mr. Justice both Senators Simmons and Overman said that Attorney General McReynolds had asked them about the Greensboro attorney and that they had recommended him to Attorney General McReynolds. "What I knew about Mr. Justice," said Senator Simmons, "I told him that he was one of the ablest lawyers in the State and that I thought him especially fitted for the work which the government wanted him to perform. I added that my recommendation might have some weight, because while Mr. Justice and I were on friendly terms we had not always been together on issues in the Democratic party."

"Mr. McReynolds spoke to me about Mr. Justice and I told him he was eminently fitted for the place," said Senator Overman.

After the hat was let out of the bag, Commissioner Osborn was asked what he knew about

It. The commissioner declined to discuss the matter further than to ask, "who told you about it?" It is known however that Colonel Osborn was the man who succeeded in landing the place for Mr. Justice. He is very close to President Wilson and on several occasions within the past month the commissioner has been closeted with Secretary Tumulty.

The place which has been offered Mr. Justice, pays \$7,500 a year and all traveling and hotel expenses. It is one of the most responsible positions in the department of justice and ranks second only to that of the attorney general himself. The place is similar to those held by Senator Kenyon, of Iowa, and Fred W. Lehmann of St. Louis, two of the best known lawyers in the country. Mr. Justice, it is said will be given some of the largest "trust busting" jobs of the country. His first assignment, however, will be the task of convincing the courts that \$2,000,000 worth of land now being held by the railroad interests should be diverted to the United States government.
