The Control of Currency.

Philip J. Scudfder, who is supposed to know what he is talking about, reports that J. P. Morgan & Co., the First National Bank of New York, the Guaranty Trust Company, the Bankers Trust Company and the National City Bank have 118 interlocking directors in 34 banks and trust companies, with resources of \$2,979,000,000 and total deposits of \$1,983,000,000.

The later figures represent greater values than all the gold in the United States. The former figures are two-thirds the value of all the money in the United States. The deposits of these related institutions are in excess of the national debt by more than eight hundred million dollars. Resources and deposits total an amount a fraction less than 4 per cent of the wealth of the United States.

This composite voice is the voice that clamors when there is talk in Washington of control of the banking and currency. This colossal interest now easily holds that control.

Mr. Morgan said that the basis of credit was character. Mr. Vanderbilt now insists that he was a farm boy and wore overalls, that a good many of his fellow bankers have been poor and that everybody in general is honest. It is perfectly natural that these gentlemen, conscious of great ability and rectitude, should be loath to be turned over to the people of the United States the control of their monetary system.

But it is going to be done.—Greensboro News.
