Death of Miss Mamie Johnson.

The following is an account of the death of Miss Mamie Johnson, a former resident of Roxboro. The family has the sympathy of the community.

Miss Mamie Johnson who has been critically ill for the past nine days, passed away at 1:20 Saturday following an illness of about three years. She had suffered from tuberculosis about three years, and during the past year her condition has been more or less serious. A few months ago she was a great deal better and her friends had hopes of her recovery. Nine days ago Miss Johnson underwent an operation in the hopes of getting well. She underwent the operation very successfully and for a time it seemed that she would get well. Yesterday morning, however, she began to sink rapidly, and died at the early hour this morning.

The death of this young woman is one of the saddest that has occurred in the city in some time. She was a native of Person County but has been living in Durham for a number of years, and had made scores of friends since coming here. She possessed a sunny disposition and a fine nature that made her popular with all people with whom she was thrown in contact. Miss Johnson was 25 years old.
