Walking Around the United States.

Jas. C. Carter and James Travis, known as the One Arm Jims, arrived in Roxboro Monday on a walking expedition around the U. S. They left Chicago, Ill., August 2, 1913, without a penny, and are not allowed to beg nor borrow and their only means of making a cent is by selling their souvenir post cards. If they arrive at the gates of the Panama Exposition in San Francisco, Cal., by May 1, 1915, with \$2,000 earned, will be awarded \$5,000.

Mr. Carter says: We traveled 350 miles through W. Va., and Va., hardly made expenses. Arrived in Roxboro the first town in North Carolina, was surprised to find the people so hospitable and we want to thank them for the generous way they responded. We go from here to Durham then south west along the Sea Board to the Gulf States, 3193 miles covered, an average of 24 miles per day for 130 days out. We fell confident of finishing on time.
