WORLD'S LARGEST ORGAN.

The new organ which is to be placed in the great cathedral now in course of erection in Liverpool will probably be classed among the wonders of the world, as it will be the largest organ in existence. According to the "Musical Times," the organ in the Sydney town hall now has the distinction of standing first in point of size.

The Liverpool organ will take four years to construct. It will contain 215 drawstops, speaking and mechanical, and the total number of pipes will reach the remarkable number of 10,567. It will occupy two special chambers, one on each side of the chancel. It is the gift of Mrs. James Barrow of Waterloo, near Liverpool, and will cost \$450,000.
