After tying and blanketing my horse, being very cold, I sought the company of the aged man on the sunny side of the church. As I approached him I said good morning brother, my name is Boone. "Oh! yes this is our preacher," Yes, sir. "Well my name is Person" I am very glad to know you Bro. Person.

"Well are you related to the late T. A. Boone". Yes sir, distantly. "And I expect you are akin also to Daniel Boone". Yes sir, I can trace my kin on my father's side to both Daniel Boone, and a noted Indian Tribe, and on my mother's side to William Penn, her father being a Quaker preacher. Wife and baby. Well, Bro. Person it is now three minutes of preaching time, and there comes a little boy to build us a fire. "You don't mean to start preaching before the crowd gets here, do you?" Well that depends upon whether or not the crowd is here in three minutes.

"Well how do you like this part of the country?" Now Bro. Person that is a difficult question to answer, unless I had seen more of your county. "Well we have a good county." Yes I guess so, wish I had time to talk with you about the prohibition law, the good road movement, educational conditions, your standard of morals, and your type of citizenship, and if you will meet with me once a week, or as often as you can we will talk over these matters concerning your county. Well, we have only five but we must begin service.

After a song, prayer and scriptural reading, I preached or at least tried, but the people were just beginning to come in. They kept on coming in, one and two, two and one, until toward the last we had a splendid congregation in number. While I was untying my horse to leave, others were tying, and going in.

Good bye, brother Person, don't forget our engagement.
