General Huerta in his note of protest delivered to President Wilson by Minister De Gama, of Brah strongly intimated that if the United States continues to encroach on territory he will not recognize the work of mediators.

Tomorrow the navy department through Mr. Bryan will take up with the mediators a protest against the extinguishing of navigation lights along the Mexican coast. It is intimated that unless the lights are restored American landing parties will be put ashore to take charge of all the lights. Protests against the extinguishing of the lights have been made to the state department by foreign interests and it is realized something must be done to keep the shore lights burning.

Unless Provisional President Huerta brings about the immediate release of Vice Consul Silliman, imprisoned at Saltillo, Mexico, all hopes of mediation will
