#### Town Ordinance.

The loss of Tampico and of Tux- The following ordinance was passed by the Board of Town Com-

Sec. 1. That no person or persons having, driving or riding an automobile or motorcycle on or over the streets of the town shall permit the muffler on such automobile or motorcycle to remain

Sec. 2. That no person shall wilfully and unnecessarily blow the horn, or sound the alarm of any automobile, motorcycle or bicycle while same is being driven or ridden or is standing on the streets of the town. Provided that this shall not be construed so as to prohibit the proper alarm being given by persons driving or riding said vehicles, when approaching other vehicles, pedestrains and at street crossings, corners, and at other necessary and proper times and places.

Sec. 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined the sum of \$1.00.-R. H. Harris Clerk.


