OFFICIALS NOW ADMIT THAT A CRISIS EXISTS

Caranza May Send Delegates but He Must Cease His Hostilities. Still Hopeful of Peace.

Washington, June 15.—Government officials admitted tonight, that there was a crisis in the Mexican mediation conference at Niagara Falls over the selection of men to represent the proposed provisional government. They, however, still seemed confident that conditions presented would be met.

Late in the day word came from Niagara Falls that the South American mediators had replied to the recent note from General Carranza, chief of the Mexican constitutionalists, stating that his offer to send delegates to the peace conference would be accepted only if he agreed to cease hostilities against Huerta. That Carranza would not consent to such a condition had been repeatedly asserted by him and all his representatives. This development therefore caused no change in the diplomatic situation so far as the United States was concerned.

Revival at the Baptist Church.

The revival which has been in progress at the Baptist church for more than a week is still in progress, with renewed interest at each service. Rev. Mr. Suttle, who is doing the preaching, twice daily, is a man of God, of rare power as a pulpit orator, and his work here is being wonderfully blessed.

On Sunday evening at 8:30 o'clock he preached to the men and boys only, and it was a beautiful service. The house was nearly full of men and boys, and the attention was the very best. The Preacher told them some things which they will not soon forget, and at the close of the service he called on all who were willing to pledge themselves to see that Roxboro was made a better town to come and give him their hand. Many went forward and made the pledge.

During this meeting many have professed faith in the Lord and quite a number have united with the Baptist church, while many others will unite with the other churches of the town. We take great pleasure in saying that the coming of Mr. Suttle has meant much to the town and he has won a warm place in the hearts of all of us.

Interest Try To Check Program Of Administration.

Washington, D. C.—President Wilson came out today with a flat declaration that, despite what he characterized as a deliberate campaign by certain interests to secure adjournment of Congress and postponement of the administration's trust legislation program he would use every influence at his command to get the pending bill through the Senate at this session.

Choosing his words carefully, the President disclosed his belief that organized distribution of circular letters and telegrams among business men, members of Congress and other public officials calling for an adjournment of Congress, a halt in the trust bills, an increase in freight rates for the railroads and a "rest for business" was responsible for what he recently described as a "Psychological depression."

State Gets Share of Road Money.

Washington, D. C.—North Carolina will get the full \$40,000 allotted to it by Congress for experimental road building. Of this amount \$10,000 is already being expended in Old Fort township. The other \$30,000 will go to the Winston-Salem-Statesville route where \$104,000 in all will be spent for a splendid roadway 49 miles long. The postoffice department describes this sketch of proposed roadway as the best proposition of its kind presented by the State.

Death List of Rebels Is 3000.

Mexico City.—Telegraph reports received at the capital Tuesday from Zacatecas says that the losses of the Constitutionalists in the battle at that place are estimated at 3,000.

Washington, D. C.—Organization of the new national banking and currency system entered its last stages today when President Wilson nominated the five men, who serving with the Secretary of Treasurer and the Comptroller of the Currency ex-officio, will constitute the Federal Reserve Board.

President Wilson will select one of the men's names today to be governor of the board. It is generally expected that Mr. Jones or Mr. Hamlin will be designated.
