Destitute

The foundation will send a commission to Europe in a few days to report as to how, when and Thompson's majority 296. where aid can be rendered most effectively. At a cost of \$275,000 Falready has chartered a ship and visions for Belgium relief.

Mr. Rockefeller has been in communication with Ambassador Page at London and made public a cablegram in which the Ambassador describes the dire'ned of the Belgians and says it will require a million dollars a month for seven or eight months to prevent starva-

"In fact," the ambassador added, "many will starve now before food can reach them."

Mr. Rockefeller made it clear in his announcement that steps taken by the foundation will be "absolutely neutral." The commission of investigation will be headed by Wickliffe Rose, a director general of the International Health Commission.

"This action will but supplement the public spirited efforts of the Belgian relief committee, said Mr. Rockefeller in announcing the foundation's plan.


Turks Regret Their Action

London, Nov. 2.—Turkey is making frantic efforts to keep out of the war. It is stated in diplomatic circles tonight that the grand vizier has tendered to the powers on behalf of Turkey an apology for the acts of the Turkish battleships in their raid on Russian Black Sea ports. Although no official statement has as yet been made on the subject the report is given credence generally.

While the negotiations for Turkey's extrication from her belligerent situation were proceeding a combined British and French squadron in the Gulf of Pechme hunted down and sunk two Tur-Hish warships. They were the Turkish gunboat Dubekreiss and the Turkish armed steamship Kinalida.
